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





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THE GENTLEMAN FROM PERU



It's been 10 years since a group of college friends made a vow: that the first to get rich would rent a boat and invite the others on a cruise. Now, the friends find themselves marooned at a luxurious hotel on the Amalfi Coast in Italy. While their boat is being repaired, they can't help but observe the daily routine of a fellow hotel guest - a mysterious, white-bearded stranger who sits on the veranda each night and smokes one cigarette, sometimes two.

One evening, the stranger approaches their table and places a hand on the shoulder of Mark, a member of the group who recently suffered an injury to that very shoulder. In an instant, Mark's pain miraculously evaporates. The group is stunned, eager to find out more about this stranger's healing powers - everyone but Margot, who is suspicious of this man and reluctant to join her friends' enthusiasm.

Soon, though, even Margot finds herself enchanted by his mystical powers, and she allows Raúl to introduce her to simple pleasures like fresh fish seasoned with peppery olive oil and swimming in the sea in midafternoon light. She also allows him to tell her things about herself - testing his unnerving clairvoyance - until she realizes that they may have already met and that this is neither the beginning of their love story nor the end.





In the rural town in Pakistan where Baadal grows up, children are named like talismans to sustain life and ward off unhappiness. At seventeen, Baadal has come to understand why his parents named him "Cloud," with hopes that their Big River will one day flow wide and blue again, and their thirst will be quenched after years of drought. But in the final year of his schooling, abundance seems impossibly far away. As his parents' marriage—full of rage, despair, and often violence—reaches a breaking point, the only comfort Baadal can afford is a budding kinship with Meena, a divorced older woman he meets on the banks of the drying river.

Meena has only just escaped her abusive husband, but her resistance to remarry soon gives way to the promise of stability and companionship that Baadal offers. Together, they leave the Town in search of greater fortunes in the City. But even strong-willed, independent Meena finds herself bowed by the strain of Badaal's punishing work schedule, her struggling beauty parlor, and the tension with Baadal's mother, Raheela, who fights for control of her son as she seeks to leave behind a life of disappointments and discover a freedom she's never known.


Told in rotating perspectives spanning from 1966 to 1998, THE RIVER, THE TOWN is an intimate portrait of a family unraveling in the throes of indigence, and a tribute to the wounded love that keeps them tethered to each other. With stark and candid prose, Farah Ali traces one family's fortunes to illuminate the relentless cycle of inequity, juxtaposing the tragic and grueling realities of poverty with the enduring struggle for compassion and humanity.

Farah Ali grew up in Karachi, Pakistan, and currently lives in London. Her work has been anthologized in the 2020 Pushcart Prize and received special mention in the 2018 Pushcart anthology. Her debut story collection *People Want To Live* published with McSweeney's Books, and includes new stories and some previously published in *VQR*, *Shenandoah*, *The Arkansas International*, *MQR*, *The Southern Review*, *Kenyon Review*, *Copper Nickel*, and others.


When the river swallowed Kai, Damien's little brother didn't die so much as vanish. As the unbearable loss settles deeper into his bones, Damien, a small-town line cook, walks away from everything he has ever known. Driving as far south as his old truck and his legs allow, he lands in a fishing village beyond the reach of his past where he hopes he can finally forget.

But the village has grief of its own. The same day that Damien arrives, a young woman from the community's most powerful family is being laid to rest. A stranger in town, Damien is the object of gossip and suspicion, ignored by all except the dead girl's mother, Ana Maria, who offers Damien a room and a job.

Grateful for her kindness, Damien soon begins to fall under Ana Maria's charismatic spell. But how long can he resist the rumors swirling through town suggesting she might have had something to do with her daughter's death? Or deny his strange kinship with one of Ana Maria's surviving daughters, Marta, who knows too well the grief that follows the loss of a sibling—and who is driven by a fierce need for revenge? Swiftly, Damien finds himself caught in a power struggle between the brujas, a whirlwind battle that threatens to sweep the whole village out to sea.

Resonant with the Diné creation story and the unshakeable weight of the Long Walk—the forced removal of the Navajo from their land—SWIM HOME TO THE VANISHED explores the human capacity for grief and redemption, and the lasting effects it has on the soul.

Brendan Shay Basham is a Diné fiction writer, poet, educator, and a former chef, born in Alaska and raised in northern Arizona. He has been awarded fellowships from Tin House and the Truman Capote Trust Fellowship, and he was a nominee for a 2016 PEN / Robert J. Dau Short Story Prize and a 2018 Pushcart Prize. Recently, he was awarded the first Native American Literary Award from the Ucross Foundation. He holds an MFA in Creative Writing from the Institute of American Indian Arts.

Award-winning short story writer Ann Beattie returns with a brilliant collection of linked stories set in Charlottesville, Virginia, in a moment of unrest.

ONLOOKERS is an astute new story collection about people living in the same Southern town whose lives intersect in surprising ways. Peaceful Charlottesville, Virginia, drew national attention when white nationalists held a rally there in 2017, a horrific event whose repercussions are still felt today. Confederate monuments such as General Robert E. Lee atop his horse were then still standing. The statues are a constant presence and a metaphoric refrain throughout this collection, though they represent different things to different characters. Some landmarks may have faded from consciousness but provoke fresh outrage when viewed through newly opened eyes.

In "Nearby," an elderly man and his younger wife watch from their penthouse as protestors gather to oppose the once "heroic" explorers Lewis and Clark depicted towering over their native guide, Sacagawea. A lawyer in "In the Great Southern Tradition" deals with a crisis on Richmond's Monument Avenue, while his sister and nephew plant tulip bulbs at her stately home.

These are stories of unexpected relationships and affiliations that affirm the value of friendship, even when it requires difficult compromises or unexpected risks. Beattie involves the reader in questions about the nature of community, as the characters grapple with complicated inheritances that are both historical and personal and the realities of their lives interact uneasily with the past.

Ann Beattie has been included in five O. Henry Award Collections, in The Best American Short Stories and The Best American Short Stories of the Century. She is the recipient of the PEN/Malamud Award for achievement in the short story. In 2005, she received the Rea Award for the Short Story. The former Edgar Allan Poe Professor of Literature and Creative Writing at the University of Virginia, she is a member of The American Academy of Arts and Letters and of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences.







Twin sisters Dempsey and Clara have always struggled to relate to each other. Their lives ricocheted in separate directions after their mother vanished into the Thames. Adopted by different parents, the twins launched their lives in separate socioeconomic worlds, all but estranged by the time they were adults —until Clara sees a woman who looks exactly like their mother, aged not a day since her disappearance, on the streets of London.

This woman shares their mother's name, Serene, and an inexplicable knowledge of Clara's psyche. As Serene burrows ever deeper into Clara's world, an alternate reality unfolds alongside the one Clara had known, in which her published books aren't hers at all, in which her very life and body may not be hers. But is this woman, somehow, Clara and Dempsey's vanished mother?

As Clara and Dempsey clash over the presence of this strange woman, Daley-Ward splits open the realm of the possible and dares to imagine alternate, expansive realities where Black women may live and create with impunity. As the novel hurtles towards its heart-rending climax, a question of origin arises. How do our roots open us up and hold us back? And can we ever be truly known by our family —by ourselves?

Blending Jacqueline Woodson's lyricism with Brit Bennett's nuanced meditations on Black sisterhood, Zadie Smith's poetic depictions of mother-daughter relationships, Rio Cortez's world-bending explorations of Afrofuturism, and the exciting novel debut that defined Patricia Lockwood's *No One Is Talking About This*, THE CATCH is a brilliant foray into the world of prose that only Yrsa Daley-Ward could write.

Yrsa Daley-Ward is a writer and poet of mixed Jamaican and Nigerian heritage and is the author of *The How, Bone,* and *The Terrible,* and the winner of the PEN Ackerley Prize. She cowrote Black Is King, Beyoncé's musical film and visual album, which also serves as a visual companion to the 2019 album The Lion King: The Gift.



With Harri just deployed in Iraq as officer for the Welsh Guards, their hope for their son to return consumes the family with dread. Yet more pressing immediacies are met at home; the working of their land, and what to do with their youngest son, Rhys, who appears to be having trouble at school. Their farm is on the brink of bankruptcy, and John's once carefully concealed gambling addiction starts to worsen as he continues to bet with money he does not have. At the same time, Catrin, a naturally gifted pianist, separates herself from her accustomed duties by having an affair with old flame Matthew Wright, who offers her a new life, a life beyond what she knows. The quiet thrill of their relationship unfolds, and suspicions high, leads John to confront Matthew in a jealous-riled confrontation...

Meanwhile, no one quite knows why Harri decided to join the army: why did he decide to leave the farm at the time he did?

For readers of Louise Kennedy, Jon McGregor, or fans of the BBC drama *Marriage*, CLOUDLESS is propelled with elemental power, set against the glorious Welsh landscape, where morning light uncovers the damages we render unto one another, the extraordinary, heavy parts of life weaving in with the mundane and regular.

Rupert Dastur is the founder of TSS Publishing, former Associate Editor of *The Word Factory*, and spent two years on the committee of the Society of Young Publishers. His writing was shortlisted for the Bath Short Story Award in 2019, and winner of the Federation of Scottish Writers Award in 2018. 
A desperate young publicist tries to save her career by turning the charismatic leader of a grungy retreat center into the hot new self-care brand in this "wildly funny, lasereyed" (Michael Cunningham) debut novel.

Jane Dorner has two modes: PR Jane, twenty-five, chummy, and eager to sell you a feminist vibrator or a self-care/bereavement subscription box; and Actual Jane, twenty-nine, drifting through mediocre workdays and lackluster dates while paralyzed by her crushing mountain of overdue medical bills. When her job performance is called into question, Jane's last-ditch effort to preserve her livelihood and pay off her debt is to land a white whale of a client.

Enter the impossibly gorgeous Cass-whom Jane discovers scrolling through Instagram - and her unassuming husband, Tom-proprietors of a "wellness retreat" based out of a ramshackle country house that may or may not be giving off cult vibes. Suddenly Jane realizes she might have found the one ladder she can climb-if she can convince them that transforming Cass herself into a high-end wellness brand is the key to all three of their futures. Magnetic yet mysterious, Cass is primed to be an influencer: She speaks in a mix of inspirational quotes and Zen koans, eats only zucchini (the most spiritually nourishing vegetable), and has baby-perfect skin. Despite Tom's reticence about selling out, Jane sets out to mold Cass into the kind of guru who can offer inner peace and make your skin glow – all at a hefty price, of course. As Jane reckons with her own long-dormant ambitions, she wonders: Can a person really "do good" for others while profiting off them? And what parts of our selves do we lose when we trade power, influence, and beauty?

Sparklingly plotted, deliciously deadpan, and irresistibly entertaining, The Glow is a razor-sharp sendup of an industry built on the peculiar intersection of money and wellness, where health is a commodity and self-care a luxury.

Jessie Gaynor's work has appeared in *McSweeney*'s *Internet Tendency*, *The New Yorker*, *WSJ Magazine*, and elsewhere. 

Marcus begins to fall for Jennifer, and he finds himself making professions of love under all the worst working conditions. But Jennifer has her own secret to keep: she's been diagnosed with macular degeneration and the visual hallucinations are escalating. The "ghosts" she sees, the visions in which Marcus has come to vehemently believe, may in fact be a symptom of an unfortunately logical affliction.

It is exactly at this moment that Callie, a teenage Korean adoptee and Marcus' next-door neighbor, walks into their life and begins to steer their world toward a reckoning neither could imagine. Callie, struggling for belonging as well as her queer sexuality, has long sought a way to reconnect with her family back in Korea. At Marcus' urging, this unlikely team of three embark on the trip of a lifetime: they'll go to Korea to try to commune with the dead, giving Callie the clarity she needs and hopefully restoring Jennifer's faith in the metaphysical.

James Han Mattson was born in Seoul, Korea and raised in North Dakota. A graduate of the Iowa Writers' Workshop, he has received grants from the Copernicus Society of America and Humanities North Dakota. In 2009, he moved to Korea and reunited with his birth family after 30 years of separation.

In Ueno Park, Tokyo, as workers and tourists gather for lunch, the pollen blows, a fountain erupts, pigeons scatter, and two women meet, changing the course of one another's lives.

Dinah has come to Japan from New Zealand to teach English and grieve the death of her brother, Michael, a troubled genius who was able to channel his problems into music as a classical pianist — until he wasn't. In the seemingly empty, eerie apartment block where Dinah has been housed, she sees Michael everywhere, even as she feels his absence sharply.

Yasuko is polished, precise, and keenly observant — of her students and colleagues at the language school, and of the natural world. When she was thirteen, animals began to speak to her, to tell her things she did not always want to hear. She has suppressed these powers for many years, but sometimes she allows them to resurface, to the dismay of her adult son, Jun. One day, she returns home, and Jun has gone. Even her special gifts cannot bring him back.

As these two women deal with their individual traumas, they form an unlikely friendship in which each will help the other to see a different possible world, as Smaill teases out the tension between our internal and external lives and asks what we lose by having to choose between them.

Anna Smaill is a poet and novelist. She was born in Auckland, New Zealand and lived in Tokyo for two years before moving to the United Kingdom where she completed a PhD at University College London. In 2015, she published her debut novel, *The Chimes*, which won the World Fantasy Award and was longlisted for the Booker Prize. She lives on Wellington's south coast with her husband and their two children.



ConaLee pretends to be her mother's maid so she can stay with her. Eliza responds slowly to treatment. They get swept up in the life of the asylum—the mystery behind the man they call the Night Watch; the child called Weed; the fearsome woman who runs the kitchen; the remarkable doctor at the head of the institution.

Epic, enthralling, and meticulously crafted, NIGHT WATCH is a brilliant portrait of family endurance against all odds, and a stunning chronicle of surviving war and its aftermath.

Jayne Anne Phillips was born in Buckhannon, West Virginia. She is the author of four novels, Lark Termite (2008), Motherkind (2000), Shelter (1994) and Machine Dreams (1984), and two collections of widely anthologized stories, Fast Lanes (1987) and Black Tickets (1979). She is the recipient of a Guggenheim Fellowship, two National Endowment for the Arts Fellowships, and a Bunting Fellowship. Cleo, her friends, and their grudging new captain will have to figure out for themselves what's going on with this self-piloting spaceship and fast, especially now that Cleo is having visions, Kaleisha can move objects with her mind, and Ros can bend time itself. But as they chip away at the Providence's secrets—and as Cleo's relationship with the holographic Captain Lucas takes on a deeper and more desperate tenor than either woman was prepared for—they start to see with frightening clarity just what darkness lies behind the stars.







Predictably, Joshua and Carlyle quickly warm to each other while Nick and Emilia are left to their own devices. Nick puts the time to good use and his flirtation with Emilia quickly blooms into romance. Though not long after the affair turns intimate, Nick begins to suspect that Emilia's interest in him may have sinister, and possibly even ancient, motivations.





And many argue that Bayes' theorem is not just a useful tool, but a description of almost everything - that it is the underlying architecture of rationality.

From medical testing to artificial intelligence, Tom Chivers shows how a single compelling idea can have far-reaching consequences.

Tom Chivers is a science writer and author. INFINITE PLAY: How Games Shape Our World

Kelly Clancy

In this astonishing debut work of non-fiction, leading neuroscientist, biophysicist and *New Yorker* contributor Dr. Kelly Clancy will explain how scientists have begun to understand the power of games in all forms of human endeavour.

She begins with the story of geneticist George Price, the forgotten genius who in the 1960s developed an equation that explained inherited traits like altruism by seeing generations as turns taken in an infinite, unending game. Price was horrified by the implications of his own discovery – the mathematics, he feared, left no room for compassion. Altruism was merely coevolved strategy. He became obsessed with proving the math wrong, and was driven to suicide.

Scientists have come to understand since Price's death that games are fundamental to all biology. From the play undertaken by lion cubs, to the hunter gatherers who use games to randomly generate strategies that won't be predictable by their prey, through the famous use of game theory by John von Neumann to develop military strategy during the Cold War, and culminating in Kelly's own use of games to design prosthetic neurological interfaces at Google DeepMind, this book is a deliberate echo of both Richard Dawkins's *The Selfish Gene* and James Gleick's *The Information*. Like Gleick's book, it will tell the story of a cutting edge scientific theory which has shaped the last century, and will define the century to come. Like Dawkins's book, it will be a ground-breaking contribution to the field, by a leading researcher and virtuoso communicator.

Kelly Clancy is a physicist and neuroscientist. After receiving her B.S. in physics from MIT, she was an astronomer before serving with the Peace Corps in Turkmenistan. She received a Ph.D. from UC Berkeley in biophysics. She is currently a postdoctoral fellow in neuroscience at University College London and DeepMind, which developed AlphaGo. Her writing has appeared in *Harper's, WIRED, The New Yorker, Nautilus, Utne Reader,* and the *Massachusetts Review,* and anthologized in 'America's Best Science and Nature Writing' (2020).





Astra Taylor is cofounder of the Debt Collective, a union of debtors. She is the 2023 CBC Massey Lecturer and the author of The Age of Insecurity: Coming Together as Things Fall Apart, Democracy May Not Exist But We'll Miss It When It's Gone, and The People's Platform (winner of an American Book Award), among other works. Her writing has appeared in publications including *The New Yorker,The New York Times, TheGuardian, n+1,* and *The Baffler*.

Leah Hunt-Hendrix has a PhD in Religion, Ethics, and Politics from Princeton University, where she wrote her dissertation on the Ethics of Solidarity. In 2012, she cofounded Solidaire, a national network of philanthropists dedicated to funding progressive movements; in 2017, she cofounded Way to Win, a network with a similar structure dedicated to electoral strategy. Both organizations are grounded in building solidarity between major donors and grassroots organizers. She has been profiled in the *New Yorker* for her organizing work.

LOVE TRIANGLE is about trigonometry, the most important idea in mathematics – and perhaps the most important idea humans have ever come up with, the concept that underwrites much of the modern world.

Triangles are unbelievably useful. They have been employed since antiquity to measure and quantify the space around us. In the 1700s French mathematicians spent the better part of a decade mapping out a chain of 115 giant across 1,500km. Through this meticulous triangles deduce measurement they were able to the exact circumference of the Earth - and thus the precise length of the new-fangled "metre". One metre was originally defined as one ten-millionth of the distance of the North Pole to the equator. To this day: if you take a step of 1m you have walked exactly one 40-millionth of the distance around the planet.

Like all Matt's writing, LOVE TRIANGLE is full of stories about people and technology – about how trigonometry allows us to map the world, text our friends and send ships into space, but also makes it possible to play the piano so that it sounds like a human voice; how it was crucial to prosecuting the balloon trip company that caused a pig stampede in Wiltshire in 2012, and allowed internet geeks to extract military secrets from a single ill-advised tweet by Donald Trump. This book finally gives triangles their day in the sun.



Screens are not the enemy that we think they are.

Over the last ten years or so, a conventional wisdom has taken hold about smartphones, video games, social media, and the internet at large. Our screen-based lives, we have been persistently told, are unwholesome - unnatural and harmful. That our ability to make meaningful connections with each other is only really possible when we meet each other offline: face-to-face.

Although the debate around screen time has largely been framed as good versus evil, all versus none, the best research we currently have paints a decidedly different picture. Screen time, it turns out, isn't a key driving factor behind drops in our mental health and wellbeing; in fact, some screen time is better for us than none at all.

In UNLOCKED, Pete Etchells argues that collectively, as a society, we have become too apprehensive - and even fearful - about screens. The opinions and beliefs that people hold about the effects that screens have on us can often be deeply idiosyncratic, grounded firmly in anecdote and lived experience. 


OUR ACCIDENTAL UNIVERSE

Our view of the Universe is changing. The old view of the timeless heavens, turning ceaselessly above us, has been replaced with a dynamic cosmos. On mountaintops and in deserts around the world, new telescopes are being built to show us this changing sky. In Hawaii, a robotic telescope spots several incoming asteroids each night, hoping to give us a few week's warning of a dangerous impactor heading our way. In Western Canada, a radio telescope designed to tell cosmologists about the early Universe is instead reporting mysterious bursts of radio waves that seem to be coming from deep space. Living under a changing sky requires a new kind of astronomy. After all, when exploring a Universe as big as ours, it's best to expect a few surprises. In a journey that starts with asteroids slamming into Earth's atmosphere before travelling through the Milky Way and out into deep space, astronomer Chris Lintott (University of Oxford, BBC Sky at Night) guides us through a century of the unexpected. From Jocelyn Bell Burnell's discovery of pulsars, to the recent passage through the inner solar system of 'Oumuamua, our first confirmed interstellar visitor, these discoveries have transformed our knowledge of the Universe.

Chris Lintott is a professor of astrophysics at the University of Oxford, where he studies galaxies and collaborates with members of the public via the Zooniverse citizen science platform. Illness is not simply a matter of biology. If you experienced side effects from your Covid vaccine, the chances are that these were caused by your belief that you would experience them – not by anything physical. When a nurse tells you that 'this is going to hurt', it does – but perhaps it shouldn't.

Our health, or lack of it, is as much about culture as it is about damaged cells, wayward hormones and other observable physiological measures. It might be hard to accept that beliefs can shape our deaths, but ideas have physical repercussions. Objective health measures depend not just on what we're doing, but what we think about what we are doing. We are cursed by our culturally-influenced expectations of illness and its causes, and it's only by understanding these effects that we can hope to alleviate the genuine suffering that they cause.

CURSED explores the dark side of the placebo effect, from mass psychogenic illnesses like Havana Syndrome, in which American diplomats believe they are being attacked by a sonic weapon and pass a similar belief on to their colleagues, to hex deaths, TiKTok 'illfluencers' and the viral pandemic of ticking they have started, and the intersection that exists between illness, psychology and technology.





Nichola Raihani is a Royal Society University Research Fellow and Professor in Evolution and Behaviour at UCL. She is Leader of the Social Evolution and Behaviour Lab in the Department of Experimental Psychology, where her group's research focuses on the evolution of social behaviour in humans and non-human species.



YOU HAVE A NEW MEMORY is a book of braided nonfiction by artist, writer, and self-professed "cog in the machine" Aiden Arata. In this singular work of cultural criticism, memoir, and colorful reportage from the frontlines of digital existence, Arata, a frequent collaborator with Phoebe Bridgers and Meow Wolf, pens a comical, tender, and profane love letter to a lost generation and conducts an open-hearted interrogation of our online selves. "We are so lost that we have fetishized loss itself, in irony, nihilism, and aesthetic numbness," Arata says. "How do you build a life when life as we know it is ending?"

With a voice that is as a warm as it is fierce, and insights as canny and frightening as they are addictive and life-affirming, Arata is an exciting writer on the rise and a generational talent.

Aiden Arata is a writer and artist from Los Angeles, where she writes essays, fiction, and the occasional screenplay. Her writing has appeared in outlets including *The Rumpus, BOMB, Hobart, The Fanzine, Wonderland* and *Alternative Press*, as well as *NDA: An Autofiction Anthology* (Archway Editions 2022). Raw, sinuous, high-stakes, BITE YOUR FRIENDS is a history of the body as a site of resistance to power, and a subversive memoir.

Eberstadt explores the lives of a handful of outrageously brave men and women—saints, philosophers, artists—who have used their own wounded or stigmatized bodies to challenge society.

BITE YOUR FRIENDS' heroes include the ancient Greek Cynic philosopher Diogenes who lived "a dog's life," sleeping, teaching, having sex in the public square; Saints Perpetua and Felicitas, two early Christian martyrs who were the mothers of new -born babies; and such twentieth-century prophets of bodily freedom as filmmaker-poet Pier Paolo Pasolini and Michel Foucault. The book features Eberstadt's own interviews with the Russian punk feminist group Pussy Riot, and the political artist Piotr Pavlensky (who nailed his scrotum to the pavement of Red Square to protest Vladimir Putin's tyranny).

Running through her narrative of the Body Militant is Eberstadt's own story and the story of her mother, a New York writer and glamour figure of the 1960s, whose illness-scarred body first led Eberstadt to seek the connections between beauty, belief, and the truths taught by bodily and psychic pain.

BITE YOUR FRIENDS' journey takes us to the Roman amphitheatre where 4th century martyrs are fed to the wild beasts, to the S&M leather bars of New York in the 1970s, and to the waiting zone of Europe's largest prison.

Eberstadt's questions are crucial ones: what drives certain individuals to risk pain, disgrace, even death, in the name of freedom, and how can we use their example to become braver?

BITE YOUR FRIENDS belongs to a contemporary tradition of cross-genre memoir/history/cultural criticism that includes Olivia Laing, Chris Kraus, Maggie Nelson, and Rebecca Solnit.

Fernanda Eberstadt was born in New York City in 1960. She graduated from Oxford University with a First Class Degree in English Language and Literature. She has published five novels and one non-fiction book about her friendship with a family of Rom musicians in Southern France. ON MORRISON

ON MORRISON is a significant work and the first of its kind, examining all of Morrison's writing through Namwali Serpell's unique lens as an award-winning critic and Black fiction writer. THE SLEEP ROOM

Jon Stock

From 1964-1972, hundreds of women were treated in a shuttered ward of the Royal Waterloo Hospital for Women and Children. At the time, it was the domain and private fiefdom of one of the most extraordinary figures in British post-war medicine, psychiatrist Dr William Sargant. Sargant wrote bestselling books and hosted programmes for the BBC; he was the epitome of the establishment consultant clinician. But he also had dark links to some of 20th century psychiatry's most disturbing avenues of research. His account of brainwashing techniques was found at an Al-Qaeda training camp in Afghanistan. He brought the technique of lobotomy to Britain, performing it – in some cases illegally – at a hospital in Bristol despite doubts of fellow practitioners.

The apogee of his career, however, was the Sleep Room on Ward 5. This was a dark gallery on the building's top floor, where patients selected by Sargant were, often without their or their families' consent, subjected to deep narcosis, sleeping for more than 21 hours per day for weeks at a time, and only roused for sessions of electro convulsive therapy. Inspired by the work of Pavlov on dog conditioning, and by the post-Freudian revolution in psychiatric pharmacology, Sargant believed in aggressive interventions. When his patients finished their treatment in the Sleep Room, they would have lost not only memories of trauma, but also any sense of who they were or why they were there. At least four died in the room.

Sargant's patients, now in their 60s and 70s, are beginning to come forward. In this literary investigation into Sargant, Ward 5, and the science of the psychology that produced it, structured around the testimony of five of its survivors, journalist and bestselling crime novelist Jon Stock will tell the story of the Sleep Room.

Jon Stock is a journalist and novelist. He worked at the *Telegraph* for ten years, on the books desk and as Weekend Editor. His new thriller, *No Place To Die*, will be published by Head of Zeus this year (under the name J S Monroe); this is his first non-fiction book.






In biology class, we learn that the body is a fundamentally cohesive organism, a collection of organs and tissues working together to a common purpose, all overseen by the brain and wrapped up tidily in a covering of skin. But while this idea of the body isn't false, it fails to give us a complete picture in one crucial way: though the system appears tidy and self-contained on the page, in reality it is far from it. Whether it is blowing its nose, mopping sweat from its brow, or excusing itself to the restroom, the human organism is essentially porous.

Our bodies continuously shed material, and while we often think of these materials as wastes, they serve far more complex functions. The exchange, elimination, and frequent disguise of our effluence has been elemental to the development of human civilization, and our lives today are still governed by a host of laws and superstitions and social mores about the materials our bodies leave behind.

In thirteen discrete chapters, Earthly Materials tells a story about one of the materials the human body sheds—from breath and urine to vomit and tears. Sometimes the questions examined are historical. What have we physically done with all the urine produced in our cities? Sometimes they approach the matter through a philosophical lens. Is it ever logical to cry? Sometimes they explore recent scientific discoveries. How does mucus undermine our understanding of natural selection? But they always offer a window into how we negotiate our place in the world and how we get along with one another.

ROMAN YEAR is a memoir that reads like a novel. Spanning a year in the narrator's late adolescence following his family's expulsion from Egypt, he is wrenched from the financially secure household of his childhood in Egypt to a poverty-stricken neighbourhood in Rome. His cruel uncle makes life for the family even worse than it already is, filled as Rome is with people whose dialect is difficult to understand. The narrator is, however, the mouthpiece for his deaf mother who speaks no Italian whatsoever.

While his younger brother ends up exploring Rome and meets people his age in the neighbourhood, the narrator shelters himself in his bedroom reading novels that allow him to picture himself living altogether elsewhere. Despite her deafness, his mother is very much like her younger son and gets to know several Italians, some of whom are as deaf as she, befriending families in their building; women for whom she cuts aprons to assist in their management of stalls in the adjacent marketplace. The daughter of one of these women, named Amina, develops a crush on the narrator, who is definitely not attracted to her. Months pass while more colourful people enter the family's orbit. Meanwhile, the narrator and his brother are admitted to an American school in Rome at a significant discount, yet the family's undeclared goal, given the mother's sister in New York, is eventually to relocate to the United States.

A Christmas trip to Paris, however, promises to change their itinerary by reminding the narrator that his family's true homeland is France, and their mother tongue, French. The return to Rome is desultory. But the narrator meets a girl, this time one to whom he is attracted, and eventually becomes the lover of a seamstress in his own building. What he fails to realize is that in the space of that one year, he has become accustomed to Rome, and moreover, now that his family is determined to move to the United States, Rome is his new love.


A seed is sown. A story is born. One thread, one needle: the story is sewn.

Top of the Pops, December 1988. The world sat up as a young woman made her debut: gold bra, gold bomber jacket, and proudly, gloriously, seven months pregnant. Ahead of its time both sonically and culturally, her song 'Buffalo Stance' represented female strength, female power and female attitude. With it, a new pop icon was born.

Following an itinerant childhood with her mother, the Swedish artist Moki Cherry, and her stepfather, the legendary American jazz trumpeter Don Cherry, Neneh Cherry went on to blaze her own trail in the music industry as a singer-songwriter, rapper and DJ. THE KING HERSELF

The old Mona Eltahawy died on November 24th, 2011, on a street called Mohamed Mahmoud near Tahrir Square, Cairo. Riot police beat her, broke her left arm and right hand, sexually assaulted her, and detained her for twelve hours, first at the hands of the Interior Ministry and then at the hands of military intelligence.

When Mona was released, she was reborn and became obsessed with uncovering secrets and breaking silences. She became an archaeologist, excavating her past to determine a new future. Inspired by Hatshepsut, Egypt's woman-god-king for whom the title pharaoh was invented because s/he was unlike any who preceded them, Mona fashions her own self-liberation to resist Islamophobia, patriarchy and misogyny to define her own identity and legacy as a queer, Muslim feminist. She wrote about taking off her hijab after nine years, about being raised to wait until marriage to have sex, about having two abortions, going through menopause and its effect on her sex life.

Spanning her conservative Muslim upbringing to losing many loved ones during the pandemic, and journeying through the US, London, Egypt and the Middle East, in THE KING HERSELF Mona Eltahawy chronicles the power of words, the reclamation of the body, healing through deliberate beauty, survival, and finding love. A collection of electrifying essays, some stemming from her work in her widely read newsletter, Feminist Giant, THE KING HERSELF is about revolution, unbecoming, and the necessary wreckage to rebuild yourself whole, for readers of Angela Saini, Cathy Park Hong, and Roxane Gay.

Mona Eltahawy is a feminist author, commentator, and disruptor of patriarchy. She is editing an anthology on menopause called *Bloody Hell! 





As a child, Brittany and her mother were often on the road, running from one precarious situation to another. From Indiana, to Ohio, to Arkansas, or Mississippi, sometimes stopping to crash with family or friends or to spend the night in a shelter—Brittany didn't care where they were as long as they were together. But every so often, her mom would surprise her—and leave.





On the morning of July 10th, 2006, Dr. Bartha had filled his building with gas that he had diverted from a pipe in the basement, and then he set off an explosion that reduced the four-story premises into a fiery heap that would soon injure ten firefighters, five passersby, and damage the interiors of thirteen apartments that stood to the west of the crumbled brownstone.

Gay Talese's byline has been synonymous with legendary portrayals of the city's characters, high and low. BARTLEBY & ME continues that tradition, concluding with an examination of a single 20' x 100' New York City building lot, its serpentine past, and the unexpected triumphs and disasters encountered by its residents and owners—an unlikely cast featuring society wannabes, striving immigrants, Gilded Age powerbrokers, Russian financiers, and even a turncoat during the War of Independence. Concise, elegant, tragic and whimsical, BARTLEBY & ME is the capstone of a master journalist.

Gay Talese was born in Ocean City, New Jersey, in 1932, to Italian immigrant parents. He attended the University of Alabama, and after graduating was hired as a copyboy at the *New York Times*.

After a brief stint in the army, Talese returned to the *New York Times* in 1956. Since then he has written for numerous publications, including *Esquire*, the *New Yorker*, *Newsweek*, and *Harper's Magazine*. It was these articles that led Tom Wolfe to credit Gay Talese with the creation of an inventive form of nonfiction writing called "The New Journalism."



Born in the Bronx, Guy Trebay was raised in an atmosphere of privilege on Long Island's North shore after his entrepreneurial father struck business gold with Hawaiian Surf, a wildly successful cologne company that capitalized on the optimism of the 1960s as marketed to "an adventurous new breed of men." But behind the facade of material prosperity lay the emotional disarray of a household dominated by a charismatic con artist father, a glamorous yet lost and careless mother, a family haunted by tragedy. By the time Trebay established a foothold at the fringes of Andy Warhol's Factory and the diverse artistic tribes that thrived in Manhattan in that pre-digital era, his father had lost his fortune, his younger sister had been arrested for armed robbery and fled underground, the family house was in ashes, and his mother was dead.

Unschooled and on his own, Trebay became a striver, wending his way through a seemingly apocalyptic landscape populated by a vibrant cast of characters, including washed-up Hollywood screenwriters of the 30s; Warhol superstars like Jackie Curtis and Candy Darling; fashion geniuses like Charles James; and emerging artists, filmmakers, writers, designers, photographers and deejays who would powerfully influence mainstream culture in the decades to come.

Hecimovich establishes the case for authorship of The Bondwoman's Narrative by examining the lives of Hannah Crafts's friends and contemporaries, including the five enslaved women whose experiences form part of her narrative. By drawing on the lives of those she knew in slavery, Crafts summoned into her fiction people otherwise stolen from history.

At once a detective story, a literary chase, and a cultural LIFE AND TIMES OF HANNAH THE CRAFTS discovers a tale of love, friendship, betrayal, and violence set against the backdrop of America's slide into Civil War.

Gregg Hecimovich is Hutchins Family Fellow at Harvard University and professor of English at Furman University in Greenville, South Carolina. He received his PhD in English from Vanderbilt University and has received fellowships from the National Endowment for the Humanities and elsewhere. He lives in Cambridge, Massachusetts, and in Greenville, South Carolina, with his wife and two children.




