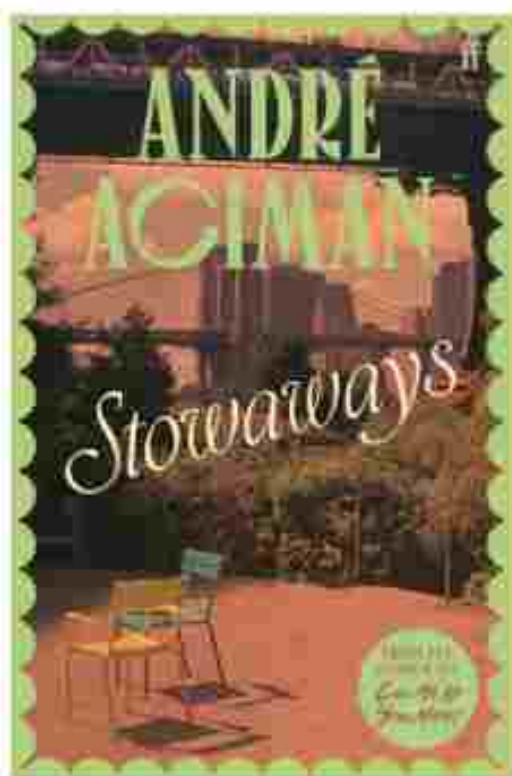

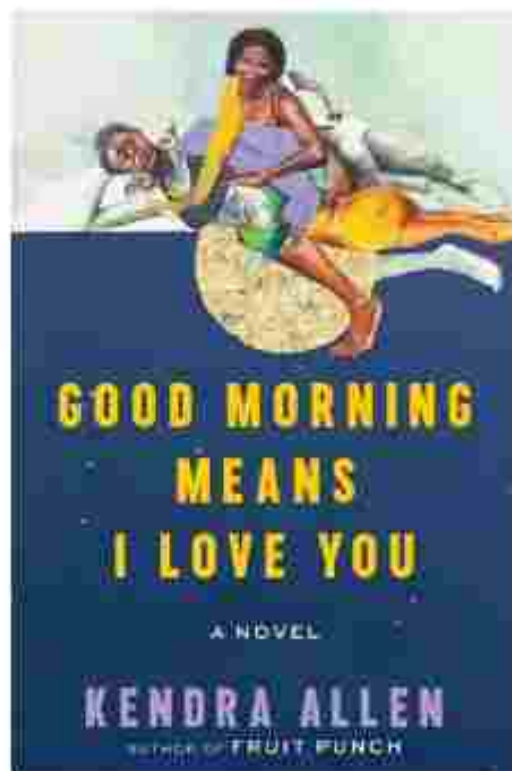

In her arresting first novel, Kendra Allen investigates love, partnership, motherhood, pleasure and the pursuit of freedom in one young woman's defiantly unconventional terms. In the span of one year, they will experience unfathomable depths of devastation – and joys they could never predict.

Good Morning Means I Love You follows Rae as she makes choices around sex, mothering, and partnership that are as stunning to everyone else as they are natural to herself. With pain and pleasure, she watches as her children learn to walk and give language to the world as her lovers contend with their own ideas of masculinity, personhood, and fatherhood. Along the way, Rae begins to understand the hardest and most beautiful truth: that we have only so much time on earth to make love, to make family, and to make good on the promise of this one, short life.

This is a novel of the self in all its simultaneities and a living portrait of intimacy written in poetic, bold, and sensual prose that shines a light on what it means to redefine expectation.

Kendra Allen is the author of the memoir *Fruit Punch*, the poetry collection *The Collection Plate*, and the essay collection *When You Learn the Alphabet*, which won the 2018 Iowa Prize for Literary Nonfiction, awarded by Kiese Laymon. She writes to music column "Make Love in My Car" for *Southwest Review*. She was born and raised in Dallas.

Hannah Assadi

The intimate, sweeping tale of one man's restless search for home the world over, as the pendulum of fate swings between loss and life, grief and euphoria, regret and hope.

Born in Palestine on the precipice of 1948's Nakba, Sufien is forced to leave the only home he's ever known, the one on the hill with a beautiful blue door. This is the precise moment when time stops making sense. He spends the rest of his life propelled forward, *always on the way*—although in search of what, he is never quite sure. In the dusty, oil-rich desert of Kuwait, he meets his first love and decides he must leave his family. In a small Italian university town, he spends his youth wrapped up in the sweet promise of the West and the forgetful assurance of wine. When life takes him to a gritty New York, he discovers his true vocation and falls for a Jewish woman born into a wholly different world. Finally, he finds himself recalled to the wild, vast open skies of the desert, in Arizona.

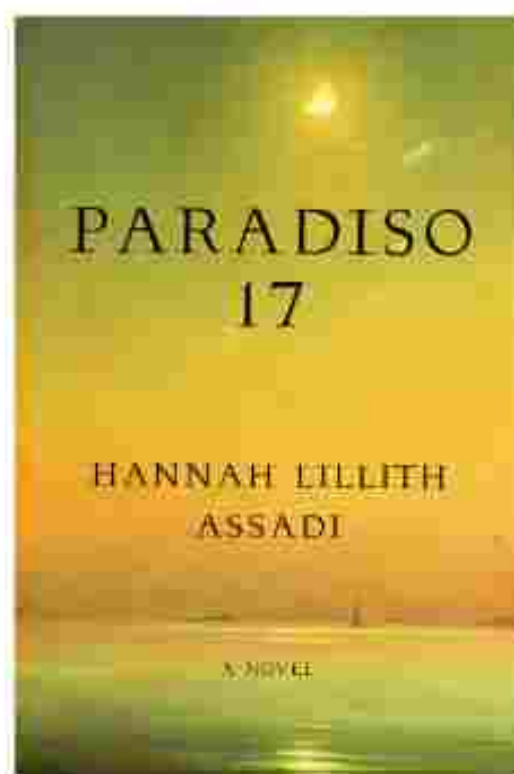
Sufien's life spans friendships lost and maintained, a stint selling leathers at a tanner's stall, the ineffable company of cats, and the freedom of the open road, the glowing pride of fatherhood, Sufi myths, prophetic dreams, and visions of the afterlife—and always, always, no matter how far he chases joy, the sweet, treacherous song of a balcony urging him to fly, to fall, to fall. The lyrical pages of *Paradiso 17* weave in and out of time and space, beginning at the end and ending at the beginning. They are haunting, haunted with grief, struck through, as Dante once wrote, with "the arrow that the bow of exile / shoots first," and yet they throb with light—not just the light that Sufien sees as he approaches his own end, but the brilliant light of a life lived.

Hannah Lilith Assadi, a National Book Foundation 5 under 35 honoree, teaches fiction at the Columbia University School of the Arts and the Pratt Institute. She is the author of *Sonora*, which received the Rosenthal Family Foundation Award from the American Academy of Arts and Letters and was a finalist for the PEN/Robert W. Bingham Prize for Debut Fiction. Her second novel, *The Stars Are Not Yet Bells*, was a *New Yorker* and NPR best book of 2022. Raised in Arizona, she lives in Brooklyn, New York.

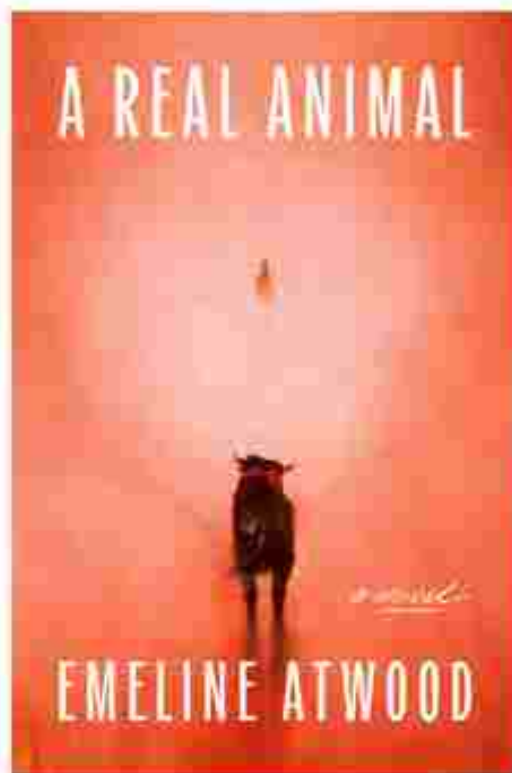

A REAL ANIMAL

Emeline Atwood

In this unforgettable debut, a moment of metaphysical transformation launches a woman's beautiful and terrifying journey through her twenties, through loneliness and complicated love that takes her from the depths of the Pacific Ocean to the plains of Texas.

A Real Animal follows Lucy through the decade dividing college and real adulthood, as she navigates three distinct romantic relationships, reckons with the false promise of family intimacy, and seeks connection with the sublime and natural worlds. Lucy wants her life to be extraordinary. But this desire never seems to graft easily onto the smallness of her world. As a senior in college struggling to quell the destructive effects of a sexual assault, she gets a glimpse of a different plane of existence—more wild, physical, animal. She moves away from home, breaks up with her long term boyfriend, stops speaking to her mother, and starts dating a complicated, violent man.

As she changes cities, friends, and partners, there is a persistent sense of wildness in Lucy and in her world that's only ever barely being controlled. The thrum of a nonhuman existential force in the back of her mind urges her to reject the ordinary, but also reminds her that she is alone in the world. She feels it in the depths of the ocean while deep sea diving, in the cold silences on phone calls with her sister and her mom, in the misunderstanding gaze of a man she thought would love her forever.

Guided by Emeline Atwood's lightspeed, suspenseful prose, we follow Lucy across states, jobs, relationships, and stages of intimacy with her family, witnessing both moments of horrific pain and quotidian happiness. The years pass by seamlessly, bringing her to the edge of her twenties and back to an altered, barren version of her childhood home, where she must finally come to terms with the fear that being human itself might mean feeling alone, and wild, and unknowable.

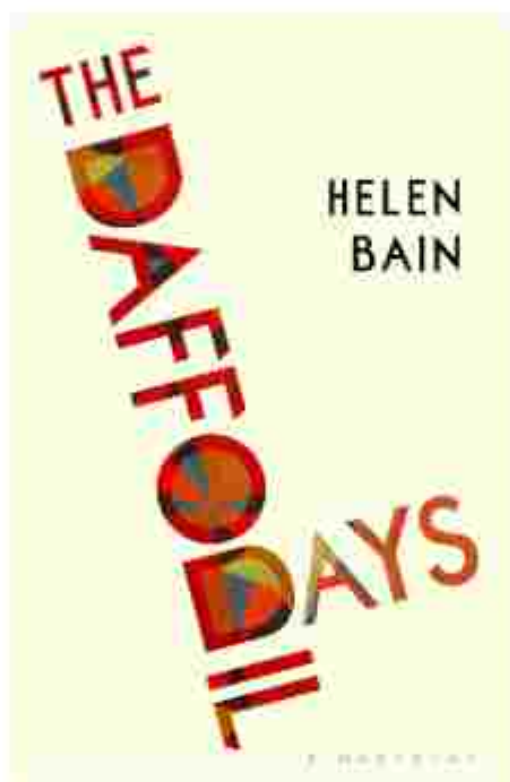

THE DAFFODIL DAYS

Helen Bain

In the early 1960s, in a small town near Dartmoor, the church bells ring. The people of North Tawton go about their days, catching glimpses of one another's lives.

There's the local GP, who knows more about his patients than he would sometimes prefer. There's the young shop assistant at Kestrels, who understands that the ladies who come there for a new outfit sometimes hope to find a new self. There's the tenant farm labourer who rings the tower bells at the church three times a week, the notes - harmonious and clashing - rippling out across the rooftops of the town.

Amid all these lives, a young couple move into focus. New to the town with their small daughter, they have escaped London for a quieter existence in the thatched house beside the church, Court Green. The life they intend to build here - out of fresh lino tiles, second-hand furniture painted with hearts and flowers, and expertly-cooked suppers for weekend guests - will be a good and happy one.

The Daffodil Days depicts a pivotal year in the marriage of 20th-century literature's most infamous couple, witnessed by the people they lived among. It is a kaleidoscopic portrait of this enigmatic pair, refracted through the rich inner lives of a rural community caught - if only for a moment - in their light.

Helen Bain received a PhD in creative writing from King's College London and holds MA degrees in creative writing and modern/contemporary literature from Birkbeck, University of London. She was chosen for The London Library Emerging Writer's Programme 2020-21 and The Genesis Foundation Emerging Writers' Programme 2022-23. In 2024 she won The People's Friend Comedy Fiction Prize. Early extracts from *The Daffodil Days* were shortlisted for the Lucy Cavendish Prize for Fiction 2023 and The Biographers' Club Tony Lothian Prize 2021. She works at the *Financial Times*; previously at *Vogue* and the *Guardian*. She lives in a village in Sussex.

Or is it an actual cult? And how much does Salomé really know? As a conspiracy unfurls, Courtney is torn between her loyalty to Salomé and what might be the story of a lifetime, the kind that could make a journalist's career—if it doesn't kill her first.

A modern reclamation of one of the Bible's most dangerous women whose story, until now, has been almost exclusively told by men, *Salomé* is a tantalizing, feminist tale exploring power, loyalty, connection, and the measures we'll take to harness our deepest desires.

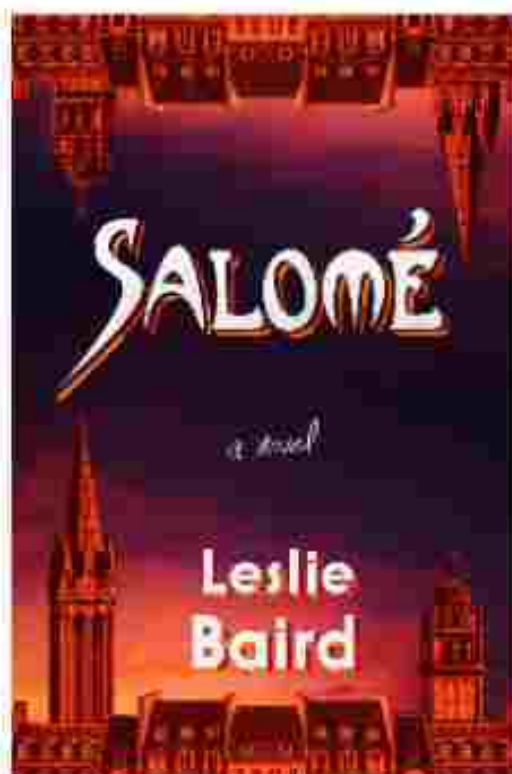

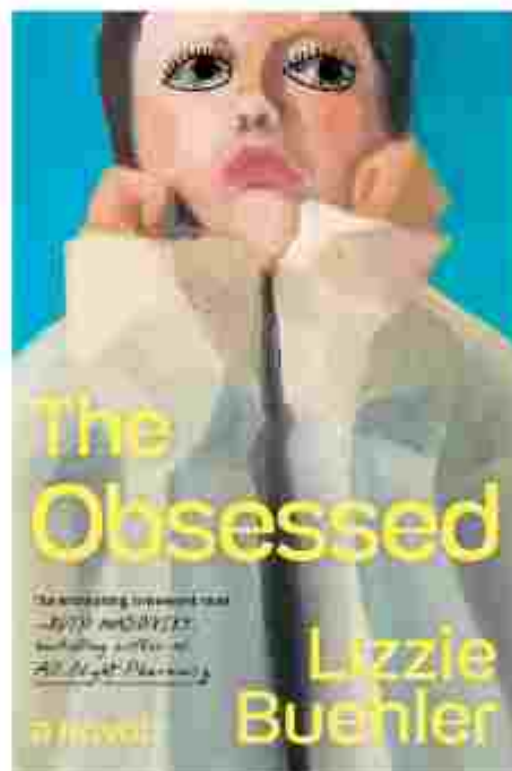

But when her boyfriend, Charlie, breaks up with her and she meets a fellow Sofiya Sova obsessive named Elijah, Astrid finds herself transcribing the love plot of her favorite novel onto her own life . . . until Elijah begins to pull away and Astrid is left flailing in a life scaffolded by obsession.

A bighearted portrait of the anxieties of desire, *The Obsessed* explores the trials of modern dating, the strange ennui of academia, and the question of how to create a world for yourself within and without the confines of your influences. What we're left with is a striking portrayal of how a willing reader can bring a text to life, and similarly the animating power of a good novel.

MY NEW FACE

A writer and her husband are spending the summer in an unnamed town. They pass their days adrift in a lush and strange place, where shops are small and intimate, the water is vivid and blue, and the streets are often empty. One afternoon, the woman sees another woman in the town square, her young son in tow. The stranger's face has an uncanny familiarity, making a small fissure in the placid surface of the season. Their uneasy intimacy will bring the writer to face what she's run from, the grief at once so private and collective, so intimate and ambient that it's become a kind of company.

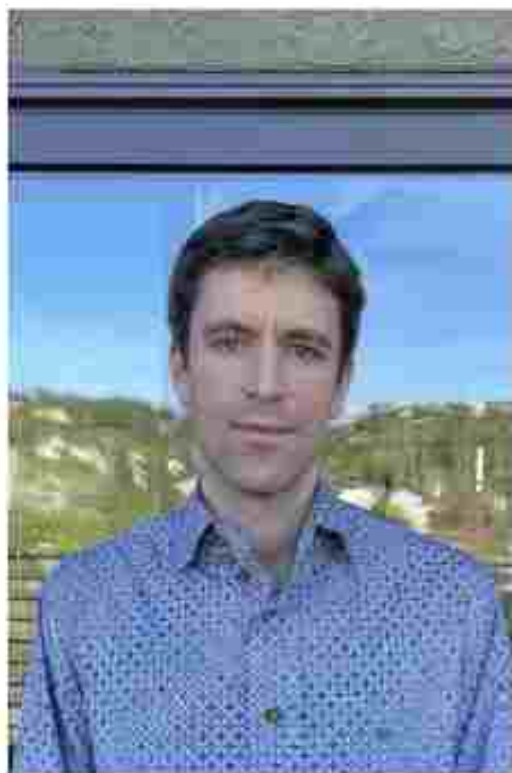

END OF LIFE

Patrick Carroll

Heartbreaking and sometimes funny, meditative and sexy, *End of Life* begins with James, a Brooklyn-based queer man in his late twenties, who's home for the holidays in the Silicon Valley, where the cognitive decline of his father—a ballet dancer turned lawyer—has gotten bad enough it can't be ignored anymore.

In the year that follows, as James flies SFO-EWR back and forth—navigating his father's health with his loving sister, an overwhelmed surgeon—many of the usual things a man at the end of his youth may expect to happen, happen—his best friend gives birth, his international lover finds another, loneliness rears up like a manticore. All these lovely human dramas give ground to the terrible and sublime ones: James discovers a craft that develops into a vocation something like his life's work; and James's father's decline progresses rapidly until he asks for physician-assisted suicide, which James must organize as he comes to mortal terms with his father's life and his own.

End of Life is a tender novel about what can and cannot be expressed, and the different moments in our life that feel like the "end." Part *Imagine Me Gone* by Adam Haslett, *Goodbye, Vitamin* by Rachel Khong and *Detransition, Baby* by Torrey Peters, *End of Life* is a profoundly moving, graceful book about the way communication breaks down—James and his lover trying to express themselves but thwarted by language; James's father desperately trying to express himself but failing to find the words—and how what is unspoken may reverberate more than what is said. Charming, the novel also finds James building a career as a textile artist, of wearable pieces with words or phrases that express whole ideas and selves.

End of Life is also a *künstlerroman* of sorts, about the beautiful and the good, as these relate to love, work, friendship, art, family, and dying. It is about the loneliness of contemporary life, mediated by screens; it is about the aftereffects of closetedness, how the drive to turn inward persists; it is about being a millennial, that last generation whose childhood at least was free from algorithmic enclosure.

Patrick Carroll studied comparative literature and creative writing at Princeton under Edmund White, Joyce Carol Oates, and Jeffrey Eugenides; earned his MFA in fiction at UC Riverside under Susan Straight, Steve Erickson, and Jane Smiley. He lives in Los Angeles, where he makes a living as a visual artist and clothes-maker, including the garment worn on the cover of the new Harry Styles album, pictured here. This is his first novel.

Los Angeles, early '90s. Rodney King has been beaten, East LA has burned, the Northridge earthquake has collapsed the 10 freeway, and two handsome brothers from Beverly Hills are on trial for the brutal murder of their parents. The entire country is riveted.

So is Hugo Byrne.

A renowned journalist - decades sober, privately repressed, and haunted by the violent death of his own daughter - Hugo arrives at the Chateau Marmont to cover the trial for a glossy national magazine. He intends to write the definitive account of the Menendez trial. Instead, he finds himself less interested in the evidence, and pulled into something murkier, lurid, and tragic.

What happens outside the courtroom - the lives disrupted, in some cases ruined - is just as fascinating as the theater inside. And no one fascinates Hugo more than his close friend Liv Ellis, a quick-witted, bookish Beverly Hills society wife who accompanies Hugo to the trial and whose obsession with the trial is as mysterious as her origins.

What happened in the Menendez house? Who is Liv Ellis? And what happens in the homes of the glitterati that haunt the city's seen and be seen restaurants, hotel lounges and tennis clubs?

A heady mix of true crime, high-toned dish, and dark psychological noir, *Smog* is a story of wealth, privilege, and abuse - a suspenseful inquiry into the dark heart of that universal institution that is supposed to protect us but so often betrays: the family.

Stephanie Danler was ten years old when the infamous Menendez brothers trial commenced and was allowed to attend the court proceedings alongside her aunt, Pam Bozanich, who was the original prosecutor.

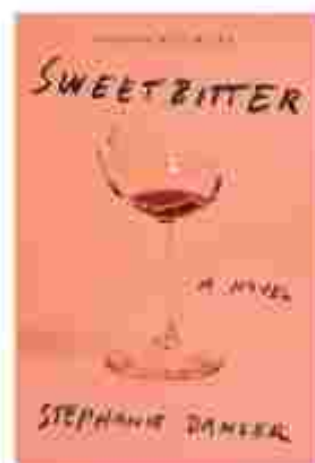

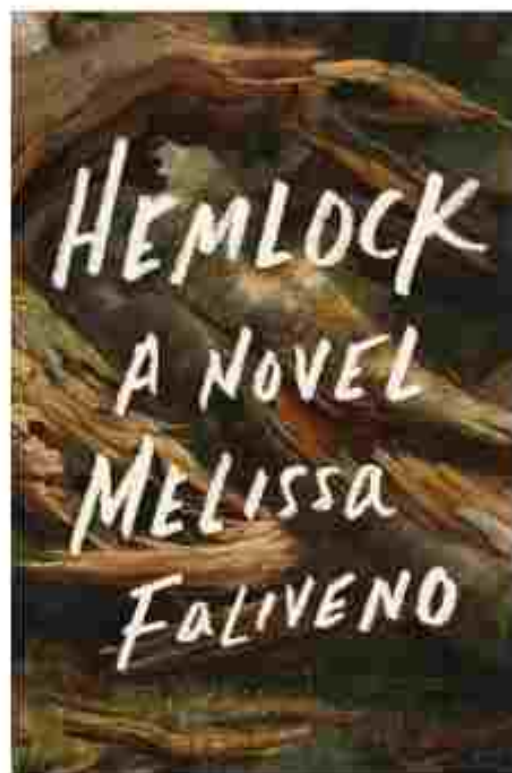

Sam, finally sober and stable with a cat and a long-term boyfriend in Brooklyn, returns alone to Hemlock, her family's deteriorating cabin deep in the Wisconsin Northwoods. Instruction Manual for Future Lover is an unabashedly delightful comedy of the Gen Z dating landscape and a sharp, tender meditation on what it means to inhabit your own life. In Madeline Garfinkle's fizzy upmarket debut for readers of *Margo's Got Money Troubles*, a single woman accepts a plus-one to an upcoming wedding and embarks on a crusade of ruthless self-improvement to get someone—*anyone*—to fall in love with her so she won't be alone if she runs into her ex, Liam, and his not-at-all-new girlfriend at the event. A searing, tenderhearted, and hilarious coming-of-age about trying to use romance to unstuck yourself from your own life—when perhaps the person you've been waiting to arrive is yourself.

At twenty-nine, our narrator is detangling her life from a long string of questionable choices made in her early twenties. But she's got this. She's doing the daily crossword, daily. She's getting that tattoo removed. She's dating, or trying to. She's on the apps, she's on dates, she's Out There. But as the wedding approaches and Liam, the ex she never got over, starts drunk-texting at all hours, the rest of her precariously constructed new life begins to crack. As she tumbles through the absurdities of modern dating—from Feeld to throuples—she finds herself in increasingly outrageous and even dangerous situations in her mad dash away from herself and towards love, acceptance, and salvation. When her desperation to find love spirals out of control, and much more than a plus-one to a Montauk wedding is on the line, she must finally decide what version of her life to claim—even if she's not sure what she deserves.

Instruction Manual for Future Lover is *The Wedding People* for your twenties with the laugh-out-loud humor and dry wit of Monica Heisey's *Really Good, Actually*, the frank, off-center brilliance of Alexandra Tanner's *Worry*, and the wild romanticism of Raphael Bob-Waksberg's *Someday Who Will Love You In All Your Damaged Glory*. Intimately narrated, keenly observed, and lit with compassionate humor, Gaynor turns her trademark incisive gaze on privilege and its performances with her easy, comedic brilliance, tackling money, class, and modern family-making. DECENT PEOPLE

Set on both sides of the Texas-Mexico border and spanning more than a century, this powerful multi-generational debut charts the fate of a gifted, young Mexican-American woman and the corrupting consequences of misogyny, racism, and colonialism on her family, her community, and, ultimately, her life.

Martha Consuelos is an overachieving, defiant teenager, wise beyond her years. Omar Romero is her perceptive, albeit mostly directionless, neighbor, a guy who rarely thinks beyond his desires. Yet, when Martha unexpectedly returns to their east Dallas neighborhood to finish high school, the two form a surprising, if uneven, bond.

Over the course of a year, Omar and Martha grow close, but it won't last. Omar doesn't turn out to be the man he thinks he is, while Martha's quest to change her circumstances only deepens. The further Martha gets—whether it's learning about her revolutionary great-grandmother or discovering what drove Mexican families like hers North—the clearer it becomes that a person like her was never going to simply be allowed to live on her own terms.

Narrated by an older Omar reflecting on his complicity in the events of that year, *Decent People* is an epic novel about entitlement, inheritance, and the quiet violences that can shape a life, especially a woman's. It's a story that explores how confronting our past—personal and collective—may reopen old wounds but also provide a way to heal.

Jessica M. Guel is a senior editor at the Natural Resources Defense Council, and has previously worked at Newsweek, Mashable, ABC/Univision, and Voto Latino. She has an MFA from NYU, where Zadie Smith was a thesis advisor to the novel, and where she was NYU's Axinn Writer in Residence. 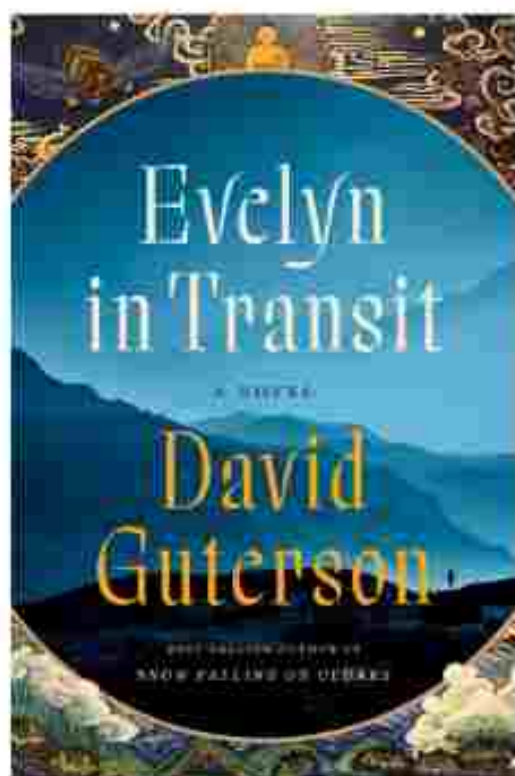

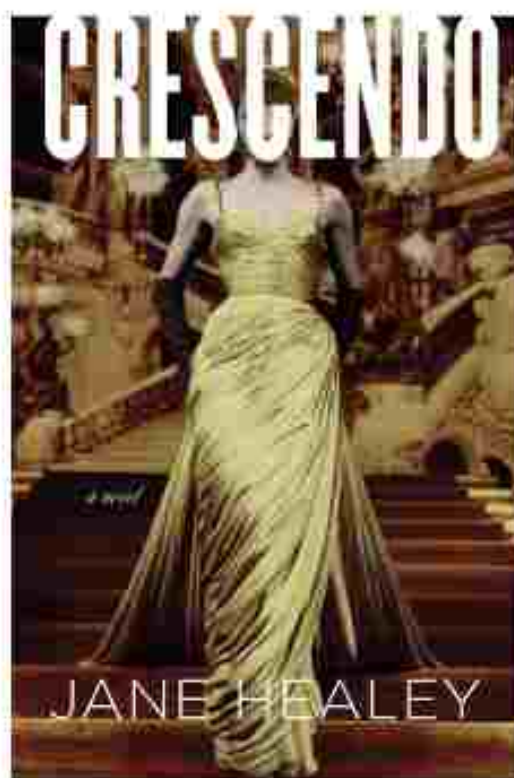

And what will happen when that one friend – the one they rarely mention, Alison, who left to become a world-famous actress on a mega-hit show and blow them all out of the water – says she's coming from LA to see them all, throwing everyone into a kind of self-reflecting panic?

Small Pond is a tender, aching, and whip smart take on love, friendship, community and success. Along the way, it breathes new life into conversations about the gendered philosophies of 'genius' and artmaking, what we should do with bad men, and whether women can be art monsters and good partners, lovers, friends. This is Heisey at her best, showing her signature wit, her fearless honesty, and her verve for the delicious, entertaining romp.

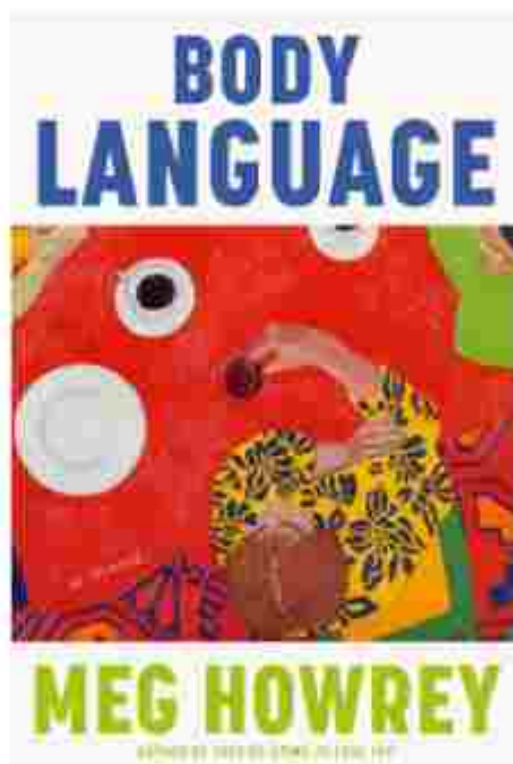

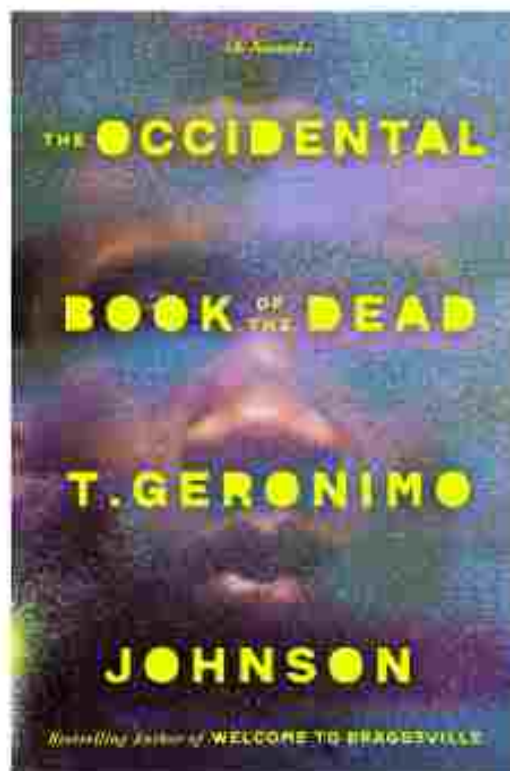

Ranging from the sinister to the tender, these witty and expertly paced stories will have you laughing out loud one minute and reaching for your best friend the next.

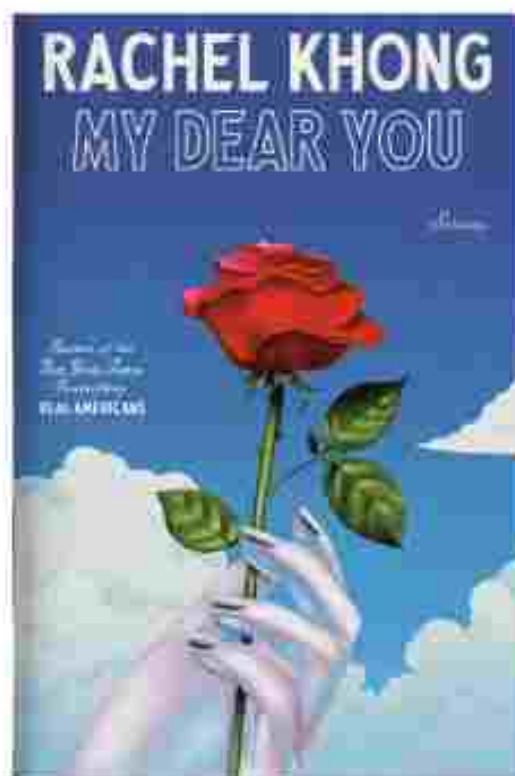

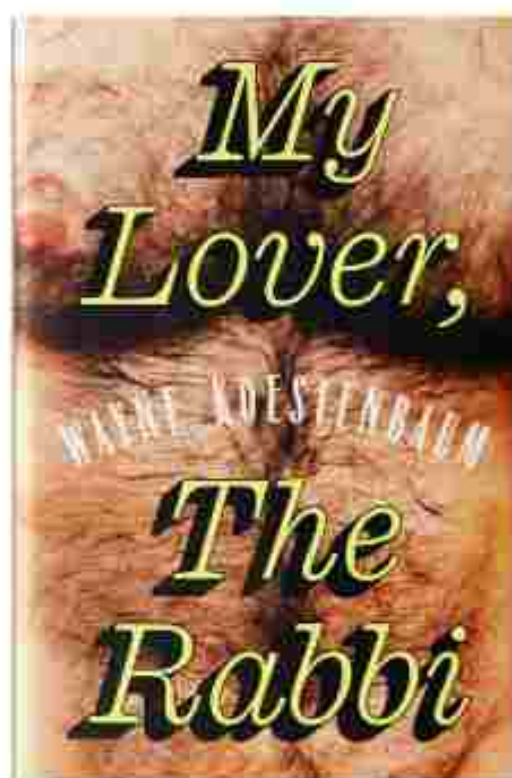

MY LOVER, THE RABBI

Years ago, when Fenny discovered she could not have children, she asked her older sister Victoria to be her egg donor. Now, she is a dormant artist and exhausted stay-at-home mother of her three-year-old daughter Zahara, living in the suburbs of DC and struggling to come to terms with the dreadful realization that she might regret having become a mother. Meanwhile, Victoria is seemingly the perfect mother and wife and increasingly resentful of Fenny's maternal ambivalence.

But when Fenny discovers that her husband has been having an affair, she decides to take a path that is unthinkable to her Nigerian family and which defies the suburban American norms they have shaped their lives around. She leaves her husband and daughter in an attempt to reclaim herself as an artist, opting to swap houses with the woman her husband cheated on her with. As tensions rise between Victoria and Fenny amid the new arrangement—and Victoria threatens to sue Fenny for custody of Zahara—Fenny seeks to understand what kind of a mother she needs to be even if it goes against everything she once expected.

With commercial instincts, Kurian has crafted a complicated meditation on a family in crisis that challenges our ideas of motherhood and American-ness. With the commercial spirit of Liane Moriarty and Raven Leilani, *American Nonsense* is a striking portrait of first-generation women trying to make sense of life in suburbia, trying to do what their mothers did in a society that's given them a different set of instructions.

Space Bar considers near-future technology and its social impacts, so in its consideration of AI could be compared with science fiction writers like Samuel Delany's anticipation of the internet and gender fluidity or Neal Stephenson's prescient vision of the metaverse. *Space Bar* also speaks and reflects the language of contemporary internet experience, so could be considered in company with novelists like Patricia Lockwood and Tao Lin. It also speaks about aging and cognitive diseases, sometimes through complex but accessible metaphor, so has kinship with Annie Ernaux's *I Remain in Darkness*, Otsuka's *The Swimmers*, Chantal Akerman's *My Mother's Laugh*, and B.S. Johnson's *House Mother Normal*. Tying these varied themes together with a cosmology that recognizes the unstable structures that create our notion of "self" (which AI and the internet's fragmentation are further destabilizing), *Space Bar* is also related to "psychedelic" thinkers like Terence McKenna and Philip K. Dick.

Eugene Lim Eugene Lim is the author of the novels *Search History*, *Dear Cyborgs*, *The Strangers*, and *Fog & Car*. His writings have appeared in *The New Yorker*, *The Believer*, *The Baffler*, *Granta*, *Triple Canopy*, *Dazed*, *Little Star*, *The Denver Quarterly*, *The Brooklyn Rail*, *Your Impossible Voice*, *Vestiges* and elsewhere. 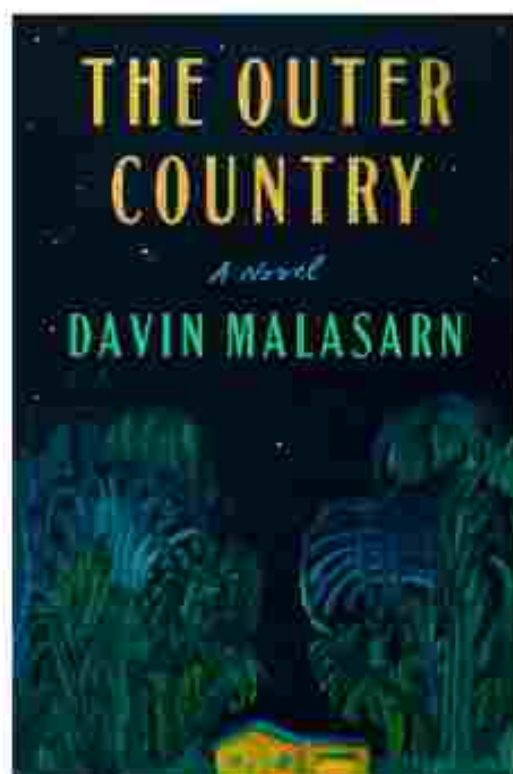

"I looked around at my charade of grown-up domesticity, the 'homemade' food, the nice wine, even the spot where he fucked me on the counter. It all seemed childish now, my life. Maybe I did need to be taken care of."

Carson's life is an endless cycle of evenings, blackout nights washing into hungover mornings, her days spent waiting until she can start drinking again, when she meets Jasper Stewart, a famous novelist and married father of two. Carson is a twenty-four-year-old orphan, lonely, out of money, and drinking her way through grief one box of wine at a time. Jasper, on the other hand, seems mature, coiffed, and, most irresistibly, to offer a rope ladder into adult life.

But when Carson is hired by Jasper's wife to nanny their two young boys — seemingly by coincidence — she becomes financially, emotionally, and professionally entangled in his family, which is starting to feel like her own. As Carson sinks into a full-fledged affair with Jasper, she finds herself at turns loathing, longing to be, and longing to be mothered by his wife, Camille. Missing her mother, beguiled by a queer situationship with another local nanny, and leaning ever more heavily on alcohol, Carson finds herself in an unstoppable freefall through New York — unless she can come to terms with her mother's death, and her own dependency issues, before crossing the threshold into permanent damage.

An Endless Cycle of Evenings is a love letter to Brooklyn and a compassionate salute to the mistakes we make in our twenties. Caroline Mason has crafted a perfect martini of a novel — one part addiction-addled grief study, six parts deliciously plotted affair, a twist of wry humor, and garnished with complex relationships between women — for readers of Imogen Crimp's *A Very Nice Girl*, Megan Nolan's *Acts of Desperation*, and Caroline O'Donoghue's *The Rachel Incident*. Crackling with energy and wit, and at times a train wreck you can't look away from, *An Endless Cycle of Evenings* is a propulsive, fun debut to the tune of Monica Heisey's *Really Good, Actually* and Rufi Thorpe's *Margo's Got Money Troubles*. To what extent can we escape our demons, and ourselves, through love? Does the ache to be parented ever let up? And what does it take to truly become an adult?

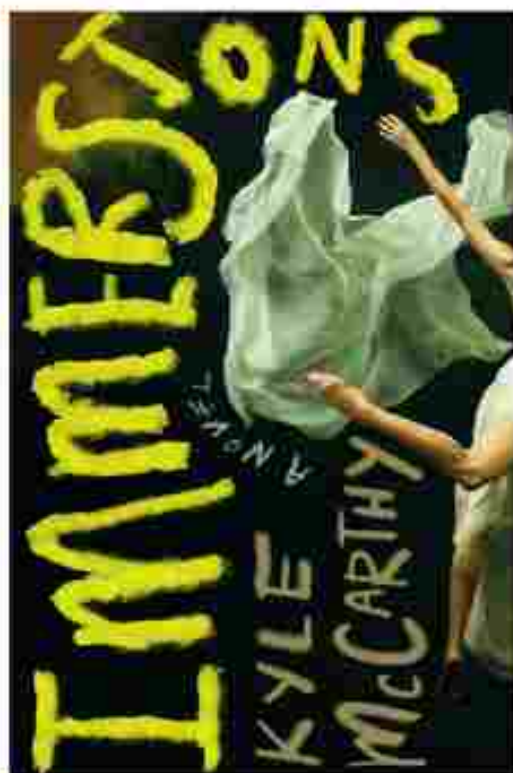

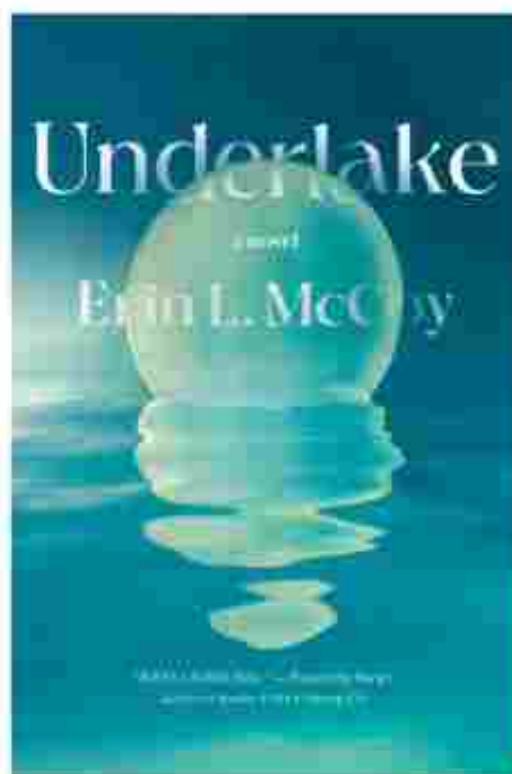

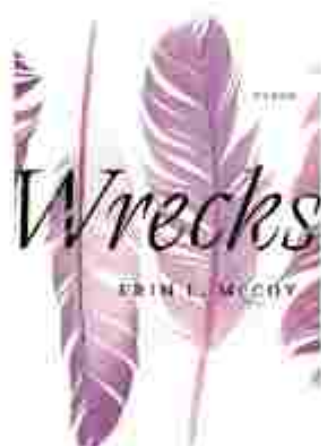

The Channel is Isle McElroy's dazzlingly original, emotionally resplendent, and timely third novel, a speculative love story about a woman, a marriage, an accident-and her television set. While *The Channel* pushes a daring fantastical premise to its mesmerizing edge-making it partly a work of trippy, intoxicating surrealism-it is, in its deepest heart, a novel embracing rich, classic themes and traditional human struggles: love, marriage, and self-fulfillment. Along the way, it asks some of the most quintessentially humane questions about being alive-questions about fantasy and intimacy, commitment and escape, regret and acceptance, and that one life event we so rarely anticipate: taking care of the person we love.

It's the mid-90s, and Paul and Johanna live a humble life in rural New Jersey. Paul is charming and modestly successful, owning a small electrical supply business with his more brutish and inscrutable brother, Horace; and Johanna, nine years his junior, no longer has to work at the miserable dive where Paul first met her and wooed her-on the spot. They have satellite television. They have a pool. They host the most exciting parties in town.

When Paul asks for a divorce one night over dinner, Johanna is blindsided. She loves the life they've created. "No," she replies. She will not let him divorce her.

Two years later, Johanna is Paul's sole caretaker, following an accident of his own doing that left him paralyzed from the neck down. Johanna, still the dutiful wife, tends to his body, his needs, their home, and their life. It is loving, if not arduous work. In between her little labors, she's glued to her television set-where the lives she observes can go beyond her wildest imagination, and everyone, it seems, is free. It's the 90's, after all, and television is in its prime.

One day, Johanna is titillated to discover something unusual on her screen: there seems to be an extra channel, one she's never noticed before, playing a round-the-clock feed of a woman who looks, acts, and talks like Johanna. Soon, Johanna realizes this doppelgänger is her-the version who agreed to the divorce and is now living a life the homebound Johanna can scarcely comprehend.

The Channel is provocative and profound-a shocking, arousing, and transfixing novel of imaginative play that works in surprisingly subtle registers. Between Johanna, Paul, the life they share, and the secret life of her other self, exists a lush forest of intimate realities-all the precise and heartbreaking expressions of repulsion, fear, love, boredom, and profound connection that make a marriage-and that define the complex act we call care. *The Channel* is as hypnotic, unusual, and ingenious as it is deeply felt, profoundly moving, and tender to the heart.

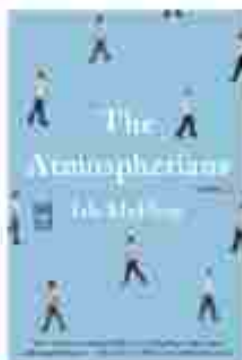

They meet at the Jack Rabbit, a misfit old school slot machine in Vegas: she's broke, glitter-smudged, and one injury away from quitting a cowgirl cabaret; he's a married, emotionally constipated HR manager grappling with his masculinity and trying a little too hard to be "sex positive." Doug wants to marshal goodness into the world one HR initiative at a time, but must impress his new boss, Jock—a guy's guy who wants Doug to play by his rules of easy fraternity and reckless masculinity—in order to secure a prime promotion. Celine is nearing the final act of her dance career—and her means of supporting Luna, her young autistic daughter. When Celine's hip gives out for good, she is forced to confront the harsh reality of her age and predicament: quit dancing but lose her identity and only stream of income, or continue at the cost of her health?

When Doug is between tacky corporate bonding events and Celine is taking five from taxing (and topless) dance rehearsals, they keep running into each other, influencing one another's lives in ways profound, startling, and irreversible. Celine reaches for a unique goodness she sees in Doug, and Doug strives for Celine's confidence. What follows doesn't feel transformative at first, just sage advice and distraction. Yet as Celine starts to see that her determination can only get her so far, and Doug begins to suspect that Jock isn't who he seems, the two must ask whether their dreams are worth the sacrifices. When their dynamic shifts, neither is entirely sure what it means or if they can carry on in its wake. Does what happens in Vegas really stay in Vegas? To Nora Ephron's age-old question: can men and women really be friends?

Jack Rabbit is a neon-bright debut, subversive of trope in a way that calls back to Dolly Alderton's *Good Material*, with the romping voice and loving narrative eye of Andrew Sean Greer. *Jack Rabbit* is Sofia Coppola's *Lost in Translation* meets *The Road to Tender Hearts* by Annie Hartnett—or, you might say, Taffy Brodesser-Akner after three Mai Tais. Who are we really when the markers of our identity are stripped away? What do we do when our moral compass stands in the way of success? What does it really take and mean to win at life?

More Abundantly is Kayla Jean Murphy's tender and hilarious debut novel that tells the story of Ruby, an ex-stripper grappling with addiction and the psychic aftermath of a childhood spent in a Christian Fundamentalist cult called The Light. When an unexpected pregnancy forces her to return home to her small Central Pennsylvania town, she becomes wrapped up in an MLM wellness scheme as she searches for a sign that God truly exists.

Feeling lovesick for the bouncer who got her pregnant and desperately trying to stay sober, Ruby decides to take a part-time job at the local Perkins, where another waitress introduces her to DailyVita, a vitamin peddling multi-level marketing scheme. Ruby attends a DailyVita party where she's introduced to KALM, the company's all natural "zen" pill, which temporarily curbs her cravings for alcohol. Upon learning of Ruby's religious background, the local DailyVita leader insists she return to The Light, claiming Christian women make loyal customers.

A return to The Light forces Ruby to confront old friends and past scars. Amidst pressure from her prayer group to speak in tongues, and from the DailyVita girls to climb the corporate ladder, Ruby's drinking begins to spiral. Things come to a head when she becomes convinced that a dunk tank baptism during The Light's annual revival could not only be great opportunity to pick up more DailyVita customers, but also may be her last hope at salvation.

Bittersweet and deeply felt, *More Abundantly* is the Appalachian lovechild of Jean Kyoung Frazier's *Pizza Girl* and Chelsea Bieker's *Godshot*. With a cast of characters that are as loveable as they are fallible, this book is a valiant portrait of a young woman's search for faith, redemption, and love as she contends with the nuances of addiction, pregnancy and abortion. Written in the voice-driven tradition of Lucia Berlin, Marilynne Robinson, and Nami Mun, *More Abundantly* reminds us that our quiet search for life's answers can be excruciating, raucous, vulnerable, and often miraculous.

As a child, Murphy grew up going to a church that was an offshoot of The Way International (there's a two-part episode about it on the Spotify Cults podcast). After The Way International split up, lots of splinter groups started, and her family belonged to one of those. While this book is not autobiographical, Murphy's childhood experience informs this aspect of the book.

BODIES OF WATER

Rebecca Winterich-Knox

Bodies of Water is the utterly sumptuous debut novel by Rebecca Winterich-Knox. Part gothic domestic drama, part literary beach read, and entirely gripping, *Bodies of Water* is a masterful portrait of love, betrayal, and surprising spiritual catharsis set over one tense week in the lives of two long-entangled families, as they reunite at an ancestral seaside manor on the rocky coast of Massachusetts to lay one of their own to rest—and to reckon with long-buried secrets.

The coastal estate of Belle Ville sits majestic and imposing on the bluffs above the town of Marmouth, once a quiet, working-class community turned seasonal playground for wealthy summer residents like Mats Rosenkrantz. Mats, newly widowed, has returned to Belle Ville for one last reunion before selling the property, to scatter the ashes of his late wife June, and to host the family to which they were closest, the Mackenzies. While long-simmering tensions between Mats and Robert Mackenzie threaten to boil over, their three grown children explore new identities and connections with each other. Bridget, the eldest Mackenzie daughter, postures as the group's free-thinking leftie; wayward Noah Rosenkrantz, grieving his mother, pops pills and pines after Bridget, who has grown unrecognizable from the girl he has loved since childhood; and Eva, the younger Mackenzie daughter bursting with secrets of her own, posts provocative photos on a dating app, where she starts to receive messages warning her to keep an eye on Mats. As Eva becomes dangerously involved with a local who has his own investment in the fate of the beach house, so too does Robert's wife, Calliope, push the limits of social propriety, becoming increasingly estranged from the others as she attempts to make psychic contact with her dead friend. When a dark revelation visits upon the house itself, the Rosenkrantz and Mackenzie families must at last contend with their pasts, themselves, and each other.

Bodies of Water moves with riveting precision and deep emotional intelligence, rotating prismatically between the perspectives of each character to mine the intensity of long-term friendships and the possibility of metamorphosis after loss. As such, it calls to mind such literary gems as Yiyun Li's *The Book of Goose* and Wallace Stegner's *Crossing to Safety*, or Shireyngart's *Our Country Friends* and Steger Strong's *Flight*. It also gestures elegantly to some of our most celebrated authors in the canon, including du Maurier, Fitzgerald, and Ferrante, brilliantly synthesizing literary tradition with delicious modern verve to place *Bodies of Water* alongside recent page-turning hits *God of the Woods* and *The Paper Palace*. Above all, *Bodies of Water* is a dazzling exploration of love beyond the boundaries of the everyday, revealing mesmerizing truths about friendship, marriage, and voyeurism—and the intimate claims we make on one another.

New Orleans, 1966. Lina is the reluctant debutante queen presiding over her town's Mardi Gras parade and wrestling with her mother's social ambitions, while Anne, headstrong and dreamy at only six years old, vies for independence from her single, working-class father. The lives of both are irreparably altered when they collide with Henry Tudor, a wealthy heir to a local family fortune with a taste for rebellion, mischief — and romance. Fast forward to 2023, and reserved but cerebral Hannah is attempting to start a new life as a producer on the set of a hit reality TV dating show "King of Hearts" while haunted by memories of her evangelical youth in Mississippi. When she begins a romance with Katy, one of the show's contestants jockeying for the hand of bachelor Ted, she's forced to ask questions about her own sexuality, her past, and whether she has the courage to claim her own fate.

Henry stretches from the mid-twentieth century to present day and follows Lina and Henry's love and dissolution; supernova Anne, who grows into a brilliant ballerina and embarks on the affair of a lifetime with Henry, now a real estate developer mogul; and Jane, a high school student and friend of Henry and Lina's daughter. Finally, these thematically linked plots are brought together in the present day in a wry twist under the narration of Parker, the sixth "wife," a home health aide hired to care for a dying Henry.

Richly spun and spiked with surprising verve; grandly cast and directed with fierce intelligence; and introducing a major new talent in fiction, *Henry* is *Wolf Hall* meets *The Bachelor* meets *The Great Believers*, and joins the growing canon of ambitious historical reimaginings such as *Circe*, *James*, and the Broadway hit *Six*. Stylized, immersive, and kaleidoscopic, it also examines the psychology of relationships alongside such writers as Gabrielle Zevin, Lauren Groff, Ann Patchett, Maggie Shipstead, and Elena Ferrante. Finally, *Henry* is a triumph of staggering research.

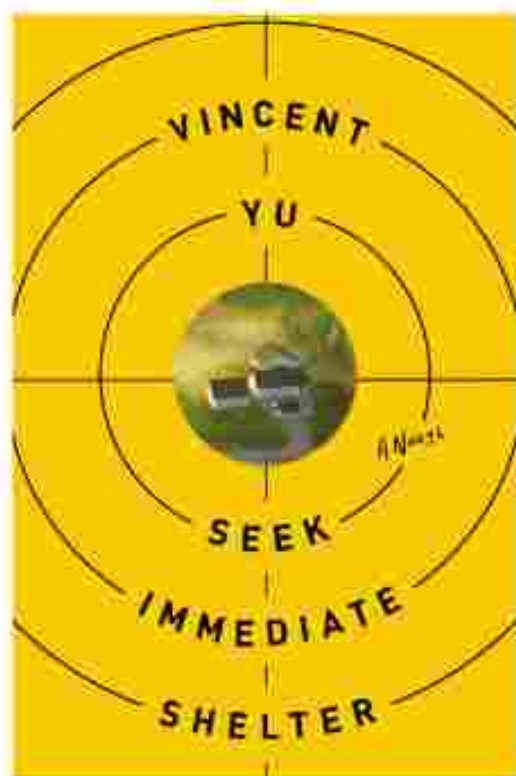

In their novel *2034*, decorated military officers and award-winning authors Elliot Ackerman and Admiral James Stavridis imagined a war between the US and China. We have it within ourselves to write a different destiny, if only we can imagine it.

Elliot Ackerman is the author of the novels *Sheepdogs*, *Halcyon*, *2034*, *Rail Dress in Black and White*, *Waiting for Eden*, *Dark at the Crossing*, and *Green on Blue*, as well as the memoir *The Fifth Act*, and *Places and Names*. His books have been nominated for the National Book Award, the Andrew Carnegie Medal in both fiction and nonfiction, and the Dayton Literary Peace Prize. DC Patrick Noble is assigned to a task force working out of Stoke Newington, gathering evidence of police corruption to use against his new colleagues. But this is a dangerous game. And his underlings – spycop Parker and reluctant civilian Suzie Scialfa – are getting restive. Turns out blackmail and intimidation can only get you so far. Meanwhile, council solicitor Jon Davies is once again lifting stones that shouldn't be lifted – this time plumbing the depths of the deal to privatise water.

As the country hurtles towards disorder, in the form of riots that even the Iron Lady can't withstand, Noble walks an inexorable path towards his own inescapable fate. Things can only get better. But first they have to hit rock bottom.

Joe Thomas was born in Hackney in 1977. He is the author of the critically acclaimed São Paulo quartet – *Paradise City*, *Ginga*, *Playboy*, and *Brazilian Psycho* – and *Bent*, which was a *Guardian* Best Book of 2020 and an *Irish Times* pick of the best crime fiction of 2020. His new novel, *True Blue*, is the final part of the Hackney trilogy, retelling the story of London's intersecting criminal, business and political worlds from the late 1970s to the end of the 1980s. Joe lives in London with his partner and son, and teaches at City, University of London.

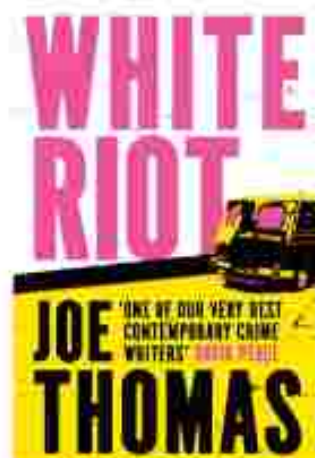

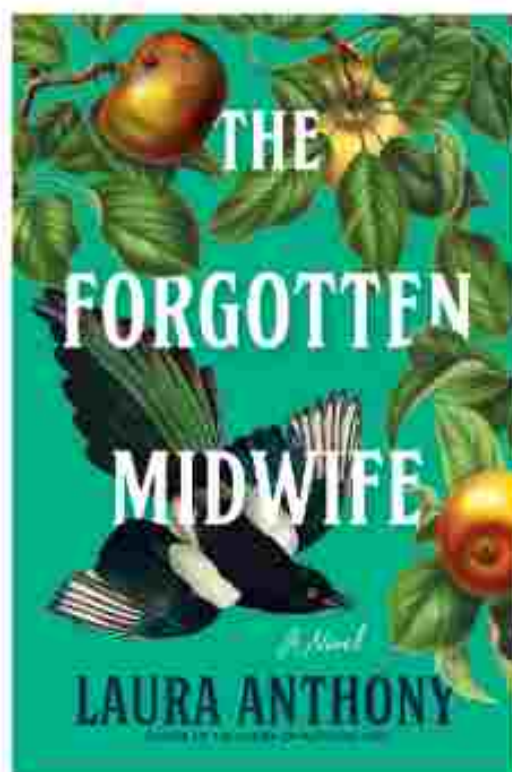

When Margaret meets a young and terrified Delia O'Rourke, the sister of her childhood best friend, she must find the strength she needs to protect this young woman and her baby in the face of a system built to ensure they disappear.

Based on true historical events, *The Forgotten Midwife* is a powerful and emotional story of the women lost to Ireland's "mother and baby homes," as well as the young women forced to join the orders that ran the establishments. 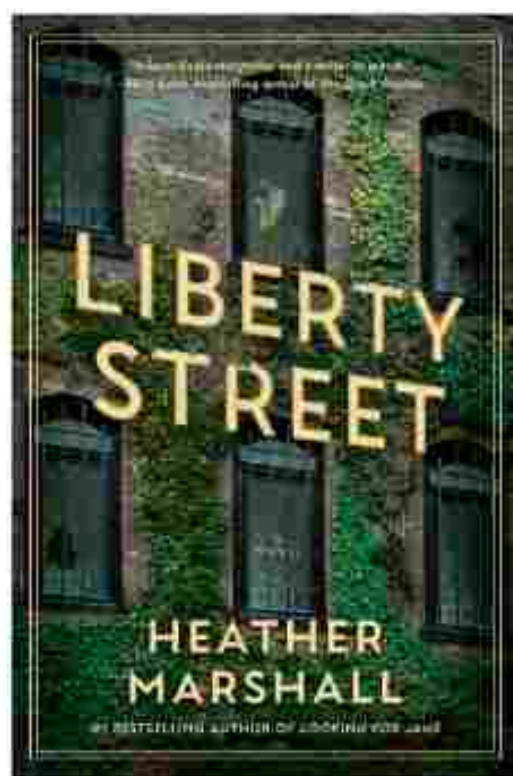

With their sights set on higher office, Bobby takes the role of the ruthless operative behind the scenes—a necessary figure in every White House hopeful's journey. But can Bobby secure his brother's success, and if so, at what personal cost?

Throughout the chaos of campaign after campaign, Bobby forges an unexpected kinship with Jacqueline Bouvier, the only woman who has, it seems, managed to tame Jack. When the cameras are on, Mrs. John F. Kennedy has no choice but to smile and wave; in private, she leans on Bobby for understanding—everyone always leans on Bobby. Their friendship is a bulwark, but when Jack's ongoing infidelity tests the boundaries of their loyalty, Bobby and Jackie must each decide for themselves what it really means to be family.

For readers of Karen Joy Fowler's *Booth*, Curtis Sittenfeld's *Rodham*, and Cynthia d'Aprix Sweeney's *The Nest*, Markland's debut is not just about one of the most significant political families of our time, but also about relationships between brothers, fathers and sons, winners and losers, politicians and the people, and the true cost to maintain them. Looking to the past—a time marked by widespread paranoia, nationalism, and the clash between authoritarianism and democracy—while speaking to today, *Men Like Us* asks not only what we can do for our country, but what we owe to ourselves.

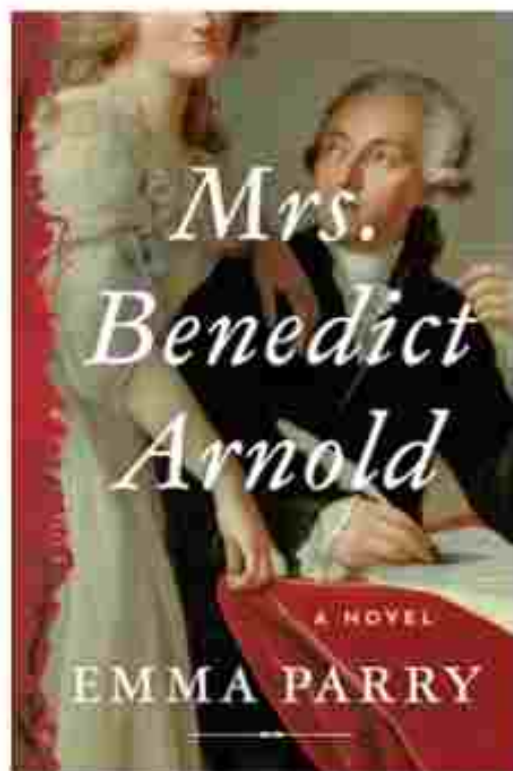

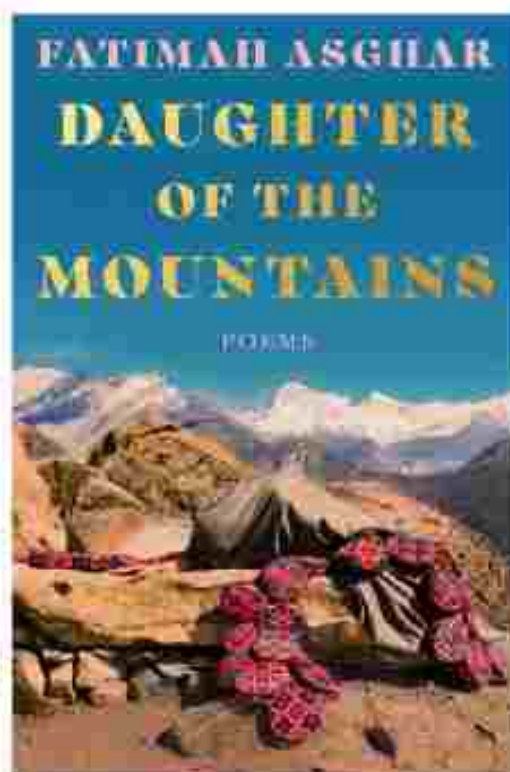

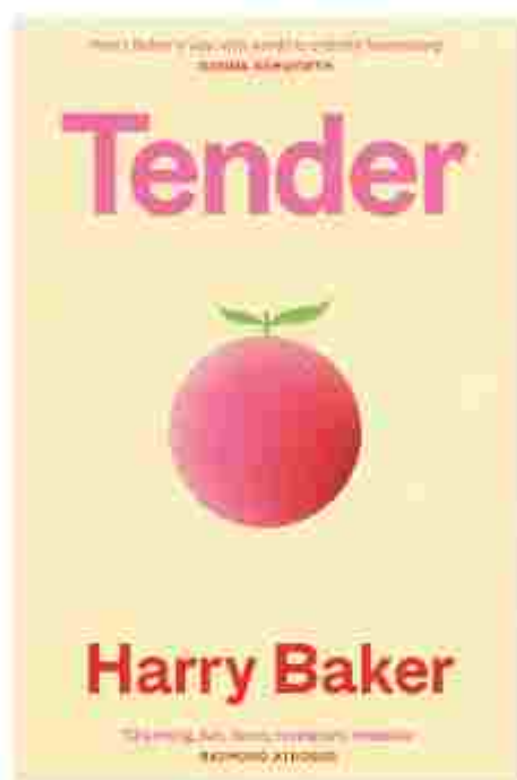

THE COLLECTED GRACES

Jackie Wang

A work of mundane mysticism and quotidian grace from National Book Award Finalist in Poetry and polymath Jackie Wang.

Combining lyric essay and narrative poetry, *The Collected Graces* centers on the experience of grace, its mysterious arrival and hasty departure, its meaning and purpose in our lives—as a manic defense against pain, or the numinous opening of a moment when one's heart is unharried and the aliveness of the world is felt. Rather than explaining what grace is, this book traces those moments, emphasizing the phenomenological experience of it over the theological doctrine of grace. It's inspired by the mixed-genre format of Anne Carson's books, the secular mysticism of Clarice Lispector, and the conversational style of poet Bernadette Mayer.

The topics she discusses include: "amor fati" (love of fate), extinction, Zen Buddhism, the concept of "panta rhei" (everything flows), dead loved ones, columbaria, the nature of memory, unrequited love, dreams, the Sterkfontein cave system in South Africa, "eleison" (mercy), "oceanic feeling" and the psychoanalysis of mysticism, libraries, brokenness, and eclipses. It broaches Persian Sufi literature, Orthodox Christian theological debates about God's uncreated light, and Lispector's exploration of the relationship between grace and filth, between ecstasy and moments of existential terror, between paradise and the gutter.

Jackie Wang is a poet, scholar, multimedia artist, and Assistant Professor of Literary Arts at Brown University. She is the author of *Carceral Capitalism* (Semiotext(e), 2018), the poetry collection *The Sunflower Cast a Spell to Save Us from the Void* (Nightboat Books, 2021; National Book Award Finalist), the experimental essay and poetry collection *Alien Daughters Walk Into the Sun* (Semiotext(e), 2023), and *The Collected Graces* (forthcoming from Nightboat).

THE GREAT SILENCE

Ted Chiang

The Great Silence started as a collaboration between the visual arts duo Allora & Calzadilla and writer Ted Chiang. The story pairs video clips with text to examine humanity's search for evidence of extraterrestrial life via the Arecibo Radio telescope, located in the Puerto Rican jungle. The narration is from the perspective of an endangered rainforest parrot that lives in proximity to the telescope. What begins as a story about ingenuity and the Fermi Paradox ends as both an indictment of man's disregard for other species and a moving message of companionship.

Since its initial showing in 2014, however, Ted Chiang's text has taken on a life of its own. It was included in *The Best American Science Fiction and Fantasy Anthology 2016* edited by Karen Joy Fowler, published as a standalone story by Electric Literature, and was included in Chiang's *New York Times* bestselling story collection *Exhalation* (Knopf, 2019). Not too long ago we were even in discussion with Ira Glass for it to be used in an episode of "This American Life".

The Great Silence is a picture book adaptation of this text.

Ted Chiang is an American science fiction writer. His work has won four Nebula awards, four Hugo awards, six Locus awards, and the PEN Malamud Award. His novella "Story of Your Life" was the basis of the film *Arrival* (2016). His most recent short story collection, *Exhalation* (Knopf, 2019), was listed as one of the Top Ten Books of 2019 by *The New York Times*, and included in President Barack Obama's 2019 reading list. In 2023, he was named one of *Time Magazine's* 100 Most Influential People in AI.

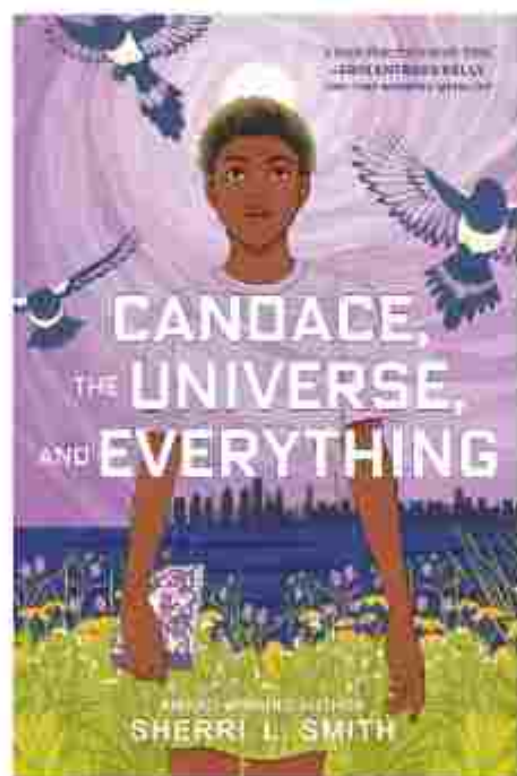

This wild spark-some have called it the human spirit-ignited the earliest forms of religiosity, from shamanic rituals to cave paintings, and then evolved through domestication into the world religions we know today. The history of religion-and of humankind-is defined by the enduring tension between the primal nature of religious experience and humanity's drive to tame and harness its power-a power that is also sometimes unleashed with terrifying force.

The Awakening tells that epic story, from the first ecstatic experiences in Paleolithic caves to the early domestication of religion in Neolithic villages; from the spread of world religions that mirrored evolutionary patterns of adaptation, extinction, and survival found in nature, to the Enlightenment's attempt to stamp out religion in modernity.

Joel Blecher is an Associate Professor of History at The George Washington University and the internationally recognized author of *Said the Prophet of God* (U. of California Press, 2018). He is the co-translator of the Ibn Hajar al-Asqalani's *Merits of the Plague* (Penguin Classics, 2023) and the forthcoming *Age of Spice: Islam's World of Trade before the Rise of Europe* (Basic Books). He has been awarded fellowships from the National Endowment for the Humanities, The Library of Congress, and the Institutes for Advanced Studies in Princeton and Berlin. He has been a guest on public radio and numerous podcasts and has contributed to *the Atlantic*.

THE TARGET TRAP

Tom Chivers,

How do we all work efficiently together to achieve the best outcomes, when our interests don't always align? The history of economics and politics is full of attempts to deal with this question, but the problem often leads to Goodhart's Law: When a measure of success becomes a target, it ceases to be a good measure. The ways we keep track of success become distorted once people optimise for them. This is why when the UK government focused on raising the number of school children attaining grades A-C, schools started devoting all their resources to C and D students. From the point of view of the metrics, no one else mattered.

This book will be about the many ways in which regulation, laws, targets and metrics go wrong. It will cover sport, health care and education, but also science, economics, and the law. It will also show why people think artificial intelligence might end up destroying the world. Rules can generate unintended consequences. The football offside rule, designed to prevent boring play, instead led to the offside trap. Players and managers optimise for winning, not for the rule's original purpose of improving the game – another instance of misaligned incentives.

There are no perfect solutions – only trade-offs. *The Target Trap* argues for humility, transparency, and an emphasis on underlying goals rather than narrow metrics. Ultimately, it is about remembering the spirit behind the rules, not just the letter.

Tom Chivers is a science writer and author. He was awarded the Royal Statistical Society 'statistical excellence in journalism' award in 2018, and was highly commended for the same prize in 2017; he has also been shortlisted for the Association of British Science Writers award and a British Journalism Award in science writing, and won the American Psychological Society media award, all in 2017. He is the author of three books: *The Rationalist's Guide to the Galaxy*, *How to Read Numbers* (with David Chivers) and *Everything Is Predictable*.

David Chivers is an assistant professor of economics at Durham University. Before this post he was a lecturer at the University of Oxford and completed his PhD at the University of Manchester, funded by the ESRC. He has published in academic journals such as *Review of Economic Dynamics*, *Economic Theory* and *Journal of Economic Behaviour and Organisation*. How Indian Migrants Made The Modern World

Twice a migrant herself—first from India to the United States, then from the United States to Britain—investigative journalist Sonia Faleiro, author of *The Good Girls*, tells the epic story of the Indian diaspora. The book begins with her discovery that the London neighbourhood she chose to live in almost at random is the former home of Dadabhai Naoroji, Britain's first Indian MP, elected to Parliament in 1895. The legacy represented by that house is largely invisible to her neighbours and to much of the local diaspora, and it becomes the point of departure for a narrative history that moves between the personal and the global.

Faleiro follows the story of Indian migration through small, intimate spaces—a rented room, a ship's cabin, a letter sent across oceans—to the bigger, colder forces that shape lives and communities. From a house in the East Midlands to a Kerala labour camp in Dubai, from an American university during the height of McCarthyism to contemporary Britain and the United States, she examines how displacement produces both extraordinary success and acute vulnerability. Along the way, the book considers the global rise of Indian political, business, and intellectual elites, alongside the persistence of caste, the growth of Hindu extremism in diaspora communities, and the embrace by some immigrants of deeply conservative and exclusionary politics. Together, these stories form a portrait of a diaspora that is reshaping the modern world.

Sonia Faleiro is the author of *Beautiful Thing* and *The Good Girls*, both of which received international acclaim and major award nominations. She is also the author of *The Robe and the Sword, a study of Buddhist extremism*, and co-edited *Gaza: The Story of a Genocide*, with Fatima Bhutto. Her work has been recognised by Human Rights Watch and has influenced legal change in India. *Everywhere* continues her focus on power, migration, and the human consequences of global systems.

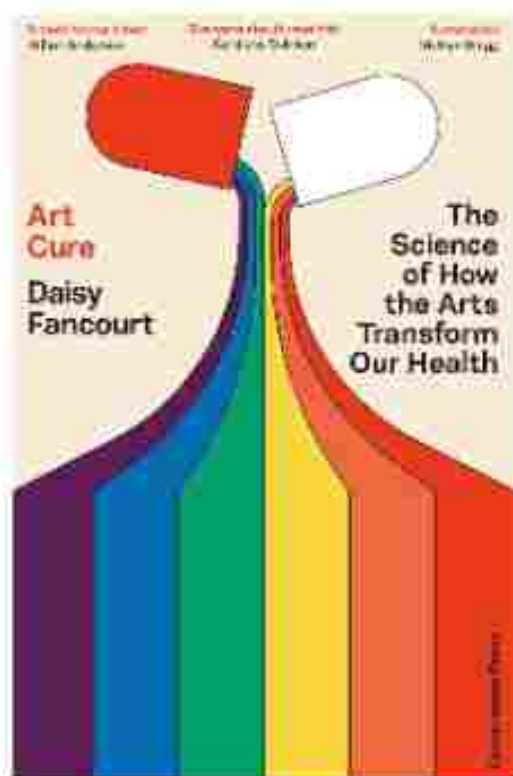

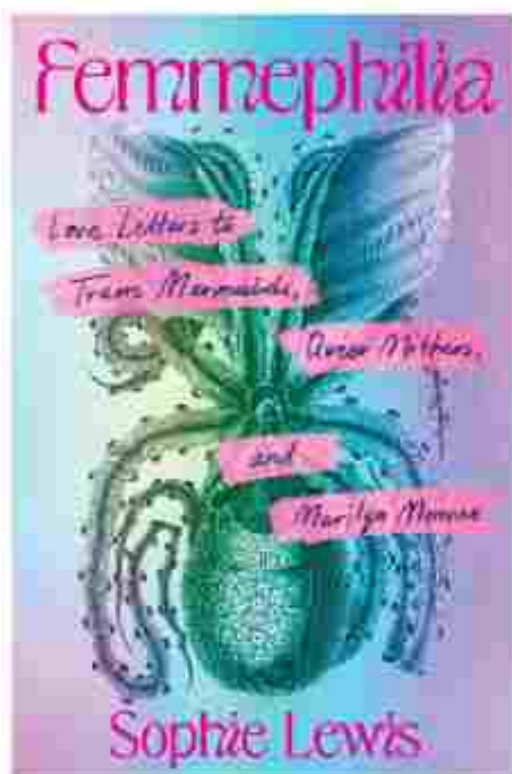

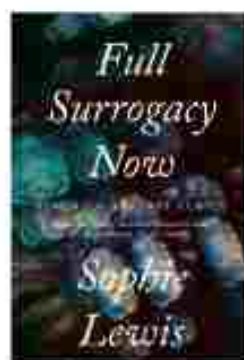

THE INTENTION ECONOMY

Jonnie Penn,

It's been six years since Shoshana Zuboff's *The Age of Surveillance Capitalism*. In that time, technology companies have embarked on a programme that will lead them to invest \$7 trillion in AI, an amount that, adjusted for inflation, approaches 25 times what the US spent in the late 1960s to plant a flag on the moon.

How will they recoup this investment? What resource is being purchased?

New York Times number one bestselling author Jonnie Penn, who is professor of AI Ethics at Cambridge and collaborator Yaqub Chaudhary, a Cambridge physicist, whose work on this subject has received huge media attention, will explain that we have moved beyond the attention economy: the new commodity is "intention". The world's most valuable marketplace is for "digital signals of intent" where AI assistants – under the guise of friends, agents and advisors – understand and manipulate human intention, and sell that information on to the companies who can profit from it. Do you have interactions with ChatGPT? Have you noticed the way your interlocutor has slowly begun to mirror elements of your style of communication? The way it expresses subtle approval of your taste in books or films, and ends the answer to each question with a suggestion about what you might want to think about next? Tech CEOs like Jensen Huang are overt about the desire to have a large language model on the front of every interaction between a human being and a computer. LLMs become the medium through which we decide what to want, giving them the power to shape not only the way we see the world, but what we buy, who we associate with, the political parties we vote for – and, in the end, human intention itself.

This, then, is a book about AI not as an ascendent natural science, but as a tool of the industry's relentless mission to recoup on its rushed multi-trillion-dollar investments. Here is an anatomy of the real threat AI poses – not as an abstract apocalyptic future, but *right now*.

Dr Jonnie Penn, FRSA, is an Associate Teaching Professor and Co-Director of the award-winning AI Ethics and Society masters at the University of Cambridge. He is a historian of technology, a #1 New York Times bestselling author, and public speaker. Penn serves as a Faculty Affiliate at the Berkman Klein Center at Harvard University, a Senior Research Fellow at the Leverhulme Centre for the Future of Intelligence, a Research Fellow and Teaching Associate at the Department of History and Philosophy of Science, and a Research Fellow at St Edmund's College. He was formerly a MIT Media Lab Assembly Fellow, Google Technology Policy Fellow, Fellow of the British National Academy of Writing and popular broadcaster.

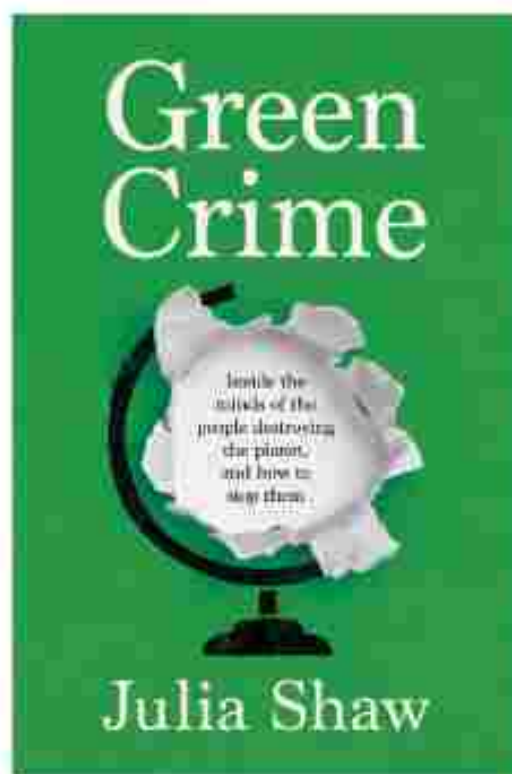

BODIES IN HEAT

Erica Berry

Weaving memoir, history, cultural criticism, new science, and immersive reportage, *Bodies In Heat* travels across time and space to explore how our sexual and romantic lives are evolving on a warming planet beset by environmental crisis after crisis.

Merging the empathic journalistic immersion of Lisa Taddeo's *Three Women* with the intimate cultural criticism of Emily Witt's *Future Sex* and the vivid new science of Zoe Schlanger's *The Light Eaters*, *Bodies In Heat* explores how patterns of love and intimacy are shaped by one natural—and as she shows, manmade—disaster. As a book about how visions of the future shape our experiences of the present, it engages the structure of a coming storm. Each of its four parts weaves components: vignettes from Berry's own life, animal science, a wider historic and/or journalistic love-story case study, and a zoom-out discussion of a wider psychological trend affecting how we think about both climate and love. Ultimately, the book considers *how we keep going*, making the case for a futuristic worldview defined by what philosopher Kate Soper calls 'alternative hedonism,' centering both sustainability and pleasure. From the middle-aged mother who overturns her life to organize a donation center for evacuees, to the newly-dumped young woman forced to move into her best friend's parents' house wearing only the pajamas she fled in, this book brings to light the embodied, emotional realities of loving through climate change.

In this way, *Bodies In Heat* is also an interrogation of twenty-first century expectations around romance. And though it stems from a place of societal loneliness and frustration with connection, her approach is one of hopeful inquiry, not defeat. Her sources remind her—and reveal to her reader—that we are all in this together. Rather than an 'eat your vegetables' climate book of didacticism and fear, this is an archive of love stories unspooling against a stormy forecast. It's a book that will alter how readers think about the entanglement of their interior and exterior environments, while also providing new perspectives on improving the landscape of each.

Erica Berry is a writer based in her hometown of Portland, Oregon. She has an MFA from the University of Minnesota, where she was a College of Liberal Arts Fellow. Her writing has appeared in *The Guardian*, *The New York Times Magazine*, *The Yale Review*, *Outside Magazine*, *Catapult*, *The Atlantic*, *Guernica*, and elsewhere. Winner of the Steinberg Essay Prize and the Kurt Brown Prize in Nonfiction, she has received fellowships and funding from the Bread Loaf Writers Conference, Tin House, the Ucross Foundation, the Minnesota State Arts Board, and the Institute for Journalism and Natural Resources. It was an age riven by stark economic inequality and ethnic fault lines; when elections were won by huge hoards of cash as much as by votes; and where labor activists and club-wielding union busters fought in the streets, with often fatal results; and when the whole world was turned on its head by a Promethean new technology.

Malcolm Brooks was raised in the rural foothills of the California Sierras. A carpenter by trade, he has lived in Montana for most of two decades. His writing has appeared in *The New York Times*, *Gray's Sporting Journal*, *Outside*, and *Montana Quarterly*, among others. He is the author of the national bestseller *Painted Horses* (Grove Atlantic, 2014) and *Cloudmaker* (Grove Atlantic, 2021).

Emma Camp

Good Boundaries: Essays on the Age of Risk-Aversion is a fearless nonfiction collection by twenty-five-year-old journalist and *Wall Street Journal* Opinion section writer Emma Camp. With this fresh, high-octane work of cultural criticism, memoir, research, and reportage, Camp surveys her peers: crushingly lonely and yet, paradoxically, rejecting nearly every opportunity for social connection. "The tragedy of modern young adulthood," Camp writes, "is that we know how to be good, but we don't know how to be happy."

Young people are gripped by a pervasive social risk aversion that is leading them, Camp argues, towards an even greater danger than what they flee: loneliness. In seven heterodox, elegantly crafted essays, *Good Boundaries* offers a field guide to twentysomething-hood in the 2020s, told with compassion, rigor, and tender hope. Camp pushes against the most foundational assumptions of modern young life with lucid, steady reasoning - from the belief that therapy necessarily makes us happier, to the delusion that participating in cancel culture will spare us from being the next outsider. In "A Companion in Joy," Camp explores our generation-wide marriage aversion, despite rising loneliness, and challenges the prevailing narrative that the most actualized self is a solitary one, examining influencer tradwives and her own decision to marry her husband soon after graduating college. With "Does Everyone Need Therapy?", available in the sample material, Camp mounts a counteroffensive against the mass movement to 'protect our peace', drawing on her own autism diagnosis to argue that it is therapy culture, not our own minds, that may be isolating us.

A dispatch from within the anxious generation, *Good Boundaries* is a much-needed state of the union for Gen Z told, for the first time, by one of their own. Camp is a dauntless young voice in cultural criticism, and she has penned a seminal text - *Rethinking Sex* by Christine Emba meets *The Age of Magical Overthinking* by Amanda Montell by way of Becca Rothfeld for the next generation. *Good Boundaries* is a paradigm-shattering debut: a wide-ranging defense of openheartedness and a rope ladder out of twentysomething misery. Camp guides readers to the threshold where life begins: the choice to expose ourselves to the horrors of rejection - and the thrills of knowing and being known. The rest is up to us.

Emma Camp is a senior newsletter editor at the *Wall Street Journal*'s Free Expression. She joined the Journal in 2026 from *Reason* magazine. THE MIGRANT AND THE MURDERER

S.C. Cornell

2025 Whiting Grantee for Nonfiction Work-in-Progress

The Migrant and the Murderer by New Yorker contributor S.C. Cornell, an interrogation into how the US justice system intersects with the crisis at the southwestern border.

The narrative unfolds via the trial for the murder of a man named Gabriel Cuen Buitimea, who was killed on January 30, 2023 on the ranch property of George Alan Kelly, a retiree in his seventies. Kelly claimed that afternoon to be "returning fire" at "drug mules" crossing his land; his legal defense was soon taken up by the American Right. By dissecting this particular case, Cornell illuminates the ongoing epidemic of vigilante and state-sponsored violence against immigrants on American soil.

Cornell approaches the case with journalistic rigor: she attended the entirety of the trial, reviewed all of the pre-trial court documents, and even gained access to audio of the hidden jury selection process. For readers of Patrick Radden Keefe, Ted Conover, and Nathan Thrall, *The Migrant and the Murderer* will expose the lies told about migrants and trace the process by which everyday Americans become radicalized. Cornell casts a critical eye on the corruption that proliferates in American immigration courts, arguing that the concept of open borders is not as radical as many seem to believe. With clear and evocative writing, Cornell paints a remarkable portrait of a country in turmoil and a dramatic account of the sobering reality, past and present, of the American border.

S.C. Cornell is a writer from Colorado. Her essays and criticism have appeared in the *New Yorker* and *The Drift*, and a reported feature on this murder is forthcoming in the *New York Review of Books*. She has a bachelor's degree in Economics-Mathematics from Columbia University and an MFA in Fiction from New York University. She lives in Mexico City and is fluent in Spanish.

THE RUBY SLIPPERS

Elizabeth Evitts
Dickinson

The Ruby Slippers is an object biography of one of the most famous, most expensive, most criminalized, most idolized, most scandalous and most important shoes in the world: the Ruby Slippers from the set of the 1939 film *The Wizard of Oz*. Sold in a 2024 auction at a record-breaking \$52 million—the most expensive entertainment memorabilia ever sold—the Ruby Slippers are, Dickinson argues, a “witnessing object for ‘home’”. Reaching back through history to their literary origins, their Hollywood production and multiple thefts, and to their recovery and reevaluation, Dickinson illuminates the complex story of obsession, crime, and cultural mythology that has made these shoes one of the most iconic—and fraught—symbols of “home” that America has to offer. Under Dickinson’s shrewd but colorful lens, we learn that the glittering slippers of Oz, a beacon of hope and home to millions, have created a long shadow of corruption, death, and longing—and how the toll on the women who encounter the shoes has been especially acute.

The Ruby Slippers is for readers of similarly hybrid classics like Susan Orlean’s *The Orchid Thief*, but it also has the appeal of a sweeping, multi-generational drama that captures the story of modern America with compelling, page-turning prose such as in Anderson Cooper and Katherine Howe’s *Vanderbilt: The Rise and Fall of an American Dynasty* and Astor: *The Rise and Fall of an American Fortune*. And in the same way that biographies such as Ron Chernow’s *The House of Morgan* illuminates the rise of modern finance, *The Ruby Slippers* has much to tell us about the rise of modern American cultural life, the birth of the memorabilia marketplace, and tensions around our emotional desire for a place to call home—in a country that commodifies the concept. Lastly, *The Ruby Slippers* also follows in the tradition of other object-focused histories, such as Mark Kurlansky’s *Salt: A World History* and Cod: *A Biography of the Fish that Changed the World*, where one item becomes the springboard into an entertaining, unexpected, and multi-layered history.

Elizabeth Evitts Dickinson is the author of the critically-acclaimed *Claire McCardell: The Designer Who Set Women Free*, which came out in June of 2025 from Simon & Schuster. 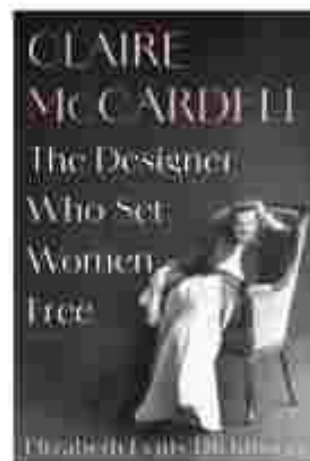

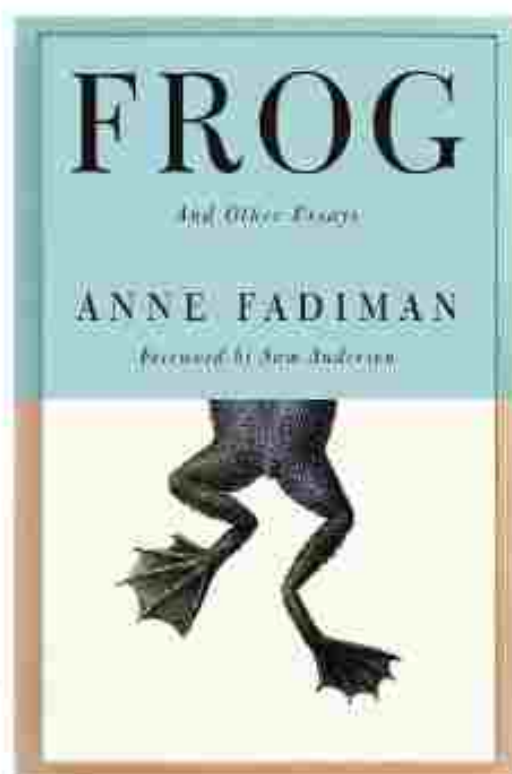

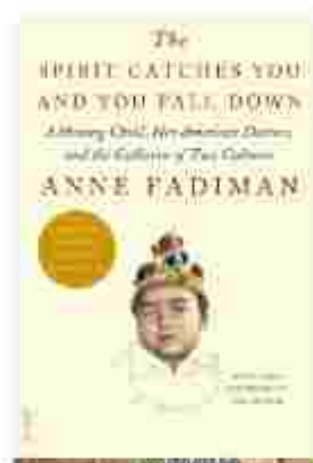

Michelle García

Anima Sola is an extraordinary, genre-bending work of lyrical memoir, cultural criticism, historical narrative, and deeply immersive reporting by award-winning journalist Michelle García. In this propulsive, provocative and probing book, told in intimate, firsthand scenes from life on the frontlines, García reexamines the violent and seductive myths surrounding the U.S.-Mexico border, from which she has reported for over a decade. In so doing, García reclaims the narrative form of 'The Western' for herself, exploding America's foundational delusions of cowboy grandeur, of good and evil, of fear begetting desire—and, in that act of epic reclamation, breaks new, hopeful ground in a critical space for the voices of women, of Latinx people, of selves without nations, and of lives that not only can, but must transcend the Western warrior mentality of borders and binaries in order to exist in freedom.

Each chapter of *Anima Sola* is propelled by its own border myth, framing and reframing, in captivating prose, the border as it has dominated popular imagination since the birth of the white nation itself: a site of national self-invention, a refuge for vice and hedonism, and an endless theater of romance and repulsion staged between the American body and its essential Latin other. On this journey, García contends with the American man's fetishization of Mexican women's sex, the weight of collective memory, the violence of living in a world of boundaries, the deep historical roots of Trump-era whistles to "build the wall," the loss of her own parents, and the liminal positions forced upon American Latinx people by everyday border fantasy. At the heart of this odyssey is a poetic history with which García must personally grapple: *Anima Sola*, García's birthright and the name of her family ranch, originally translated as "the lost woman" but which, in the light of this project's new translation, is better understood as its second meaning, "the lonely soul". In the scorched-earth reckoning of *Anima Sola* then, the term itself carves place for a new, shared, American-Latinx language: a space where the soul, rid of violence and empty of fear, can finally move toward the freedom of open space—a place where redemption is possible.

For readers of Cathy Park Hong, Jia Tolentino, Rebecca Solnit, and Carmen Maria Machado, *Anima Sola* is a monumental work of memoir, myth, and modern meaning. *Anima Sola* also finds its peers in the seminal work of Ta-Nehisi Coates, Luis Alberto Urrea, Isabel Wilkerson, John Berendt, and Lawrence Wright—as well as in the paradigm-shifting work of Nikole Hannah-Jones and the 1619 Project. Rigorous, urgent and incantatory, *Anima Sola* is the wild howl of a mind freed to reimagination, a subversive work of history that upends stagnant realities with mesmerizing grace.

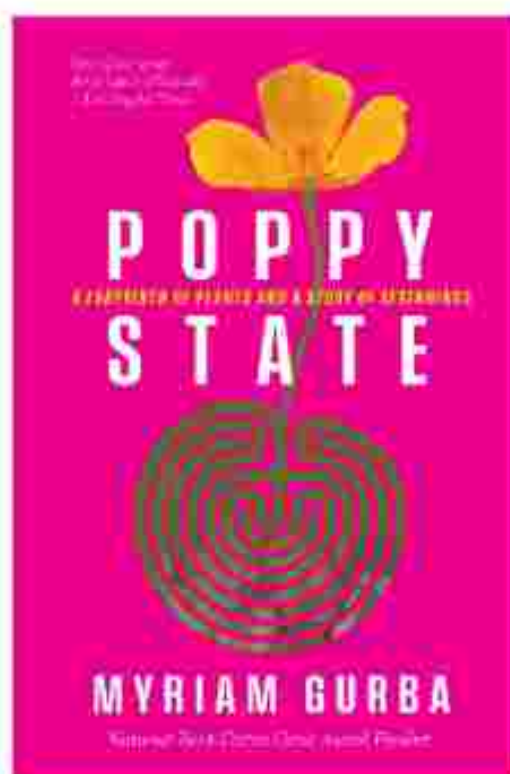

Sarah Haas

Tracing jealousy's arc through the author's relationship, this bold and rousing memoir uses one of our least favorite impulses to investigate all of our darkest emotional instincts—through art, myth, architecture, photography, and beyond.

Where does jealousy begin? With the gods? At birth; in childhood? Or in the moment a dating app match lights up a phone?

Jealousy recounts a relationship across familiar milestones—first dates, growing intimacy, sexual frenzy, turmoil and conflict, and finally marriage and childbirth. But it is also a story of unraveling. When, in the early stages of courtship, Sarah Haas inevitably discovers a former partner in an old Instagram post, she becomes consumed. She stalks and she spirals, her ever-shapeshifting obsession assuming the forms of imitation, anger, violent ideation, shame, and insatiable desire. Her jealousy forces her to confront the profane and forbidden emotions coursing through her, and examine the way they manifest in the world around her, too—in Las Vegas hotels, abandoned malls, selfies, iPhone haptics, and mass shootings. Emerging from Haas's personal story is a bigger narrative about art and culture, one that probes the history of the recorded image and its consequences.

At the heart of this memoir is a fascinating provocation: What if the only way to understand ourselves is to embrace jealousy? To admit it as a part of the self—even if the worst, most despotic part—and then to honestly describe and so face it.

Sarah Haas is a writer and editor living off-grid in the mountains of northern New Mexico. Her essays and criticism have appeared in *Literary Hub*, *Longreads*, and *The Los Angeles Review of Books* among others. She facilitates writing workshops at the New Mexico State Penitentiary and for the unhoused in Santa Fe, as supported by the Academy of American Poets. Before turning to literature, she worked as a journalist, diner waitress, and conceptual artist.

UNSEEN PLACES

Anna Kodé

From *New York Times* journalist Anna Kodé: a love letter to the power of experiencing the world with fresh eyes, and an investigation—both practical and philosophical—into what it means to observe.

One December afternoon a few years ago, Kodé stood in her grandmother's kitchen in Hyderabad, India, waiting for water to boil. Feeling restless, she grabbed her pen and notebook and started to jot down everything she noticed around her. At the time, it didn't feel that revolutionary; it was just something to do that wasn't checking her email or scrolling online. But she continued with this practice after returning to her life in New York. It became an obsession—she found herself observing on the subway, in museums, in watering holes, and on sidewalks across the city. Before long, she discovered that it had a profound impact on her life.

In *Unseen Places*, Kodé embarks on a search for a more human way of living in an increasingly fast-paced and digital world. She dives into the depths of what it means to observe, tracing the history of the act, its evolutionary function, its uses in art and psychology, and what it means today—a time of heightened anxiety, loneliness, and distraction. Exploring observational practices and insights from Italy's umarelli, scientists researching smell in Southeast Asia, conceptual artists in New York, bonobo apes in the Congo Basin, and beyond, Kodé uncovers unexpected lessons about attention and the ways we can make meaning from the act of noticing. She tries out various methods in her everyday life, and what she finds is a slower, wonder-filled state of existence.

Intellectually adventurous and warm, *Unseen Places* is a compelling argument for paying attention. Observation, Kodé explains, is not a passive act, but a powerful and radical way of connecting—to each other, ourselves, and the world at large.

Anna Kodé is an award-winning features reporter with *The New York Times*, where she covers the built environment, culture, and urban life. She's written about the urban design of "Sesame Street," the death of the public bench, and how the steel fence became a symbol of the American dream. Her work uncovers the greater significance of everyday objects and cultural moments, illuminating how deeper meaning can be found in the seemingly mundane. Kodé's reporting has been featured on *Good Morning America*, NPR, and 99% Invisible. She is also an adjunct professor at New York University, where she teaches a course on writing about city streets.

THE IMITATION MUSTACHE & OTHER ESSAYS

Wayne Koestenbaum

The Imitation Mustache & Other Essays, Wayne Koestenbaum's first collection of essays since his celebrated *My 1980s*, finds one of our most eccentric, erudite, and endlessly curious writers exploring art, music, literature, and the depths of personal experience with supercharged clarity. He brings his "alarmingly focused attention to detail" (John Waters) to a quintessentially Koestenbaum range of subjects: Susan Sontag's film *Dust for Cannibals* and the poet Kevin Killian's collected Amazon reviews; Alice Neel's expressive portraits of queer people and Hervé Guibert's photograph of a lover's backside.

Perpetually writhing within these essays is an obsessive, impressionistic reckoning with Koestenbaum's own personal questions and desires: a self-portrait with a torn t-shirt leads to a thrilling spiral over ballpoint pens, old phone numbers, and his mother; an analysis of Keats, Frost, and iambic pentameter opens a rabbit hole of desire and panic; a reflection on the act of flossing—"a retroactive prayer"—considers excavations of all kinds, corporeal and spiritual.

Collecting a range of pieces from the *New York Times Magazine*, *Bookforum*, the *London Review of Books*, and elsewhere—as well as a handful of never-before-published autobiographical works—*The Imitation Mustache* turns Koestenbaum's rare power of understanding towards the totality of life. It is, as he describes the extracted food from his teeth, "an anthology, a cluster of marks, a reckoning with formerly unseen minutiae."

Wayne Koestenbaum is a Distinguished Professor of English, French, and comparative literature at the CUNY Graduate Center. His many books span poetry, essay collections, biography, and fiction; he is also an accomplished playwright and the librettist for the opera adaptation of his book *Jackie Under My Skin*. The recipient of a Whiting Writers' Award and a Guggenheim Fellowship, he has also been a finalist for a National Book Critics Circle Award. His essays and poems have been published in *The New Yorker*, *The Paris Review*, *London Review of Books*, and many other publications. A widely shown painter, he released his first album of piano and voice in 2017. He lives in New York.

Pyromaniac - the first ever published personal story from someone with the diagnosis - is Rio's account of falling insane, being sectioned, and then incarcerated for arson, and the story of her search to understand humanity's enduring and ubiquitous fascination with fire. The book spans genres, blending memoir with history, anthropology, psychology, myth and literature, confronting what happens when you find yourself alone, beyond the bounds of the explicable.

It is a pleasure to burn, as Ray Bradbury so famously wrote. But why? It is a curse and a blessing, a fuel and a conflagration, a source of warmth, safety, and destruction. Weaving through these themes, the book explores fire as a mercurial metaphor for knowledge, technology, progress, and reprises distant stories from across cultures to demonstrate that fire is what took us from inanimate clay to humankind. When we master fire, we're almost gods. No fire, no soul. No soul, no us. Surely, fire is what we are?

Fire also brought Rio Matchett's young life close to ruin. With an honesty and rigour so rare to find in contemporary writing, Rio Matchett uses her story to ask fundamental questions about what she did, her mental breakdown and diagnosis as a pyromaniac, and what might have been done differently by the systems that punished her instead to save. Rio's depiction of her life in prison is unforgettable, but ultimately, *PYROMANIAC* is a story of love driving recovery, the vital role of friendship on the path to redemption, and the enduring flicker of human hope.

Rio Matchett is the Artistic Director and Joint CEO of Camden People's Theatre, a fringe venue in London which seeks to support and programme the best emerging and experimental theatre in the country. She gained her PhD in literary modernism and queer theory from the University of Liverpool and has taught at institutions including the University of Liverpool, Leeds Conservatoire and Birkbeck University of London and spoken on her research at University of Oxford, the Università IULM Milan, and the Sorbonne, amongst others.

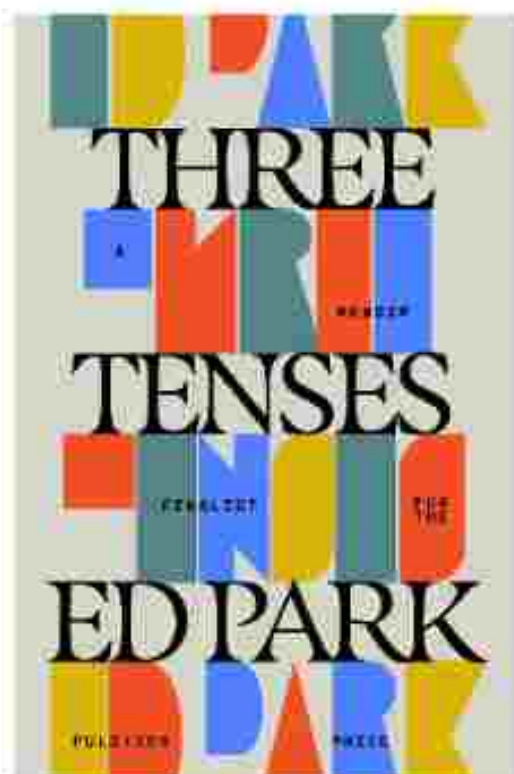

As she uncovers the ancient myths hidden in the rugged landscapes of the British Isles, the stories of women like Ariarhod, Melusine and Ceridwen awaken a forgotten power. Journeying from the Severn to Skye, Eryri to Northumberland, Kim discovers new magic in the tales of old, unveiling forgotten truths about grief and healing, while charting a new course through sisterhood and sexuality, fertility and freedom.

Happy to have left a world of Nazi skins behind, he must still navigate the casual racism and bigotry of a seemingly all-white echo chamber, a world stubbornly resistant to his Black/punk identity.

Intent on carving a space for young, Black, politically radical punk rockers like himself, Spooner undertakes a whirlwind tour of the country, collecting the stories that will become his acclaimed documentary, *Afro-Punk*, and eventually lead to the wildly successful music festival of the same name. But what begins as a way to chronicle the joys and heartaches of being Black and punk rock soon spirals into a multimillion-dollar corporate endeavor. Spooner is forced to ask himself: In setting out to galvanize an underground movement, has he in fact given rise to the least punk rock thing of all—a brand?

Illustrated with a vibrant mix of comics, spot art, and punk ephemera throughout, *It Starts with Anger* is at once a coming-of-age story about found family, a compelling capitalist cautionary tale, and a raucous celebration of the indelible, rebellious spirit of Black punks.

James Spooner is an accomplished tattoo artist, illustrator, and filmmaker. Director of the seminal documentary *Afro-Punk* and co-founder of the AFROPUNK Festival, he is the author and illustrator of the highly acclaimed and award-winning graphic novel *The High Desert* and co-editor of the anthology *Black Punk Now*. Spooner's work has appeared in *Vice*, *The Village Voice*, *The New Yorker*, *Vibe*, *Fader*, *MTV*, *NPR*, *NEC News*, and *Variety* and he is an ongoing guest curator for museums and libraries across the country.

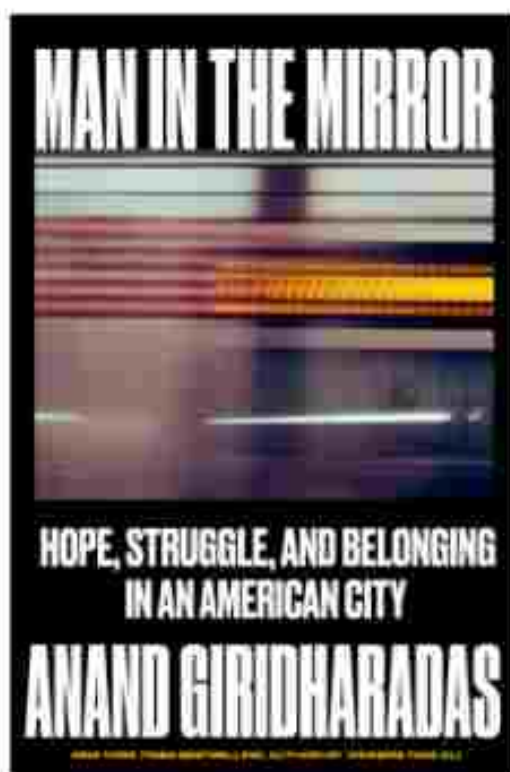

While FDR and Churchill celebrated its commitment to freedom from tyranny, the document itself was lowered into a bunker at Fort Knox. After the war, its precious ink fading, it was painstakingly preserved and enshrined.

Through it all, Jefferson's words have inspired implausibly varied causes, from suffragists and civil rights leaders to groups waging war on the US government. As Jefferson had hoped, the principles enshrined in the Declaration became a beacon to the world. But what lessons should we take from it today? Can this statement of ideals in whose name the signers pledged their lives and sacred honor bring a disparate nation together? As we gather to celebrate the 250th anniversary of the founders' bold experiment in democracy, Auslin reminds us that this enduring document was not just a call for freedom and equality but an eloquent statement of the principles that bind us together.

Julia Harte

One night in 1940, a group of Stalinists opened fire on Leon Trotsky's compound in Mexico City. In the end, the victim was not Trotsky, but his bodyguard: a young American named Sheldon Harte. For investigative journalist Julia Harte, the quest to uncover the truth about Sheldon—her father's second cousin—was just the beginning of discovering a wider, hidden history of Americans who traveled abroad to join revolutionary liberation movements—and in return were labeled radicals by the U.S. government.

These figures held various ideologies and beliefs, yet each in their own way sought to fight oppression and saw their actions as grounded in American ideals of equality, self-government, and human rights. Meanwhile, U.S. officials responded to them with surveillance, blacklists, travel bans, and prosecution.

Through meticulous research and on-the-ground reporting, Harte brings her subjects to life in deeply personal detail, exploring not only their heroic sides but also the tensions between their actions and ideals. Interrogating how and why activists were branded as threats by an expanding security state, Harte asks what makes a 'radical'. In lively narrative and rich detail, this eye-opening book reveals the long history of transnational radicalism as an irrepressibly American tradition.

Julia Harte is an investigative reporter in New York City. For the past decade, she has covered U.S. national affairs and the Justice Department for Reuters. Her writing has also appeared in publications including *Harper's Magazine*, *The Nation*, *Slate*, *National Geographic*, *The Center for Public Integrity*, and *Lapham's Quarterly*.

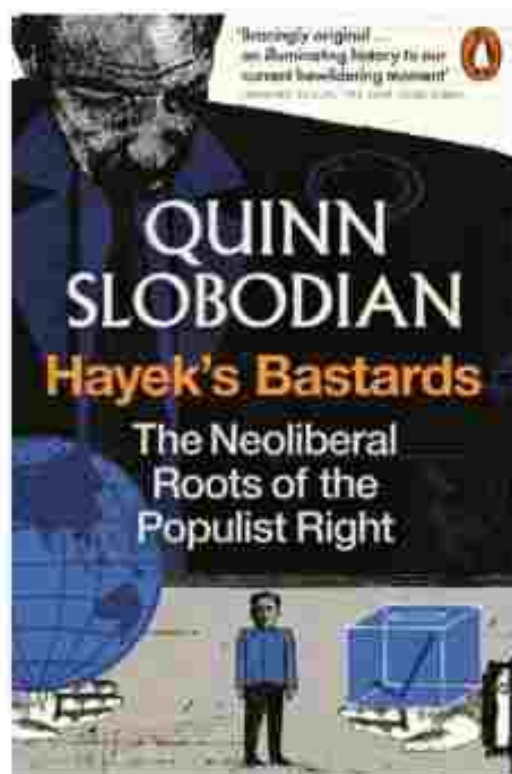

HAYEK'S BASTARDS

Quinn Slobodian

Neoliberals should have seen the end of the Cold War as a total victory – but they didn't. Instead, they saw the chameleon of communism changing colors from red to green. The poison of civil rights, feminism, and environmentalism ran through the veins of the body politic and they needed an antidote.

To defy demands for equality, many neoliberals turned to nature. Race, intelligence, territory, and precious metal would be bulwarks against progressive politics. Reading and misreading the writings of their sages, Friedrich Hayek and Ludwig von Mises, they articulated a philosophy of three hard – hardwired human nature, hard borders, and hard money – and forged the alliances with racial psychologists, neoconfederates, ethnonationalists, and goldbugs that would become known as the alt-right.

Following Hayek's bastards from Murray Rothbard to Charles Murray to Javier Milei, we find that key strains of the Far Right emerged within the neoliberal intellectual movement not against it. What has been reported as an ideological backlash against neoliberal globalization in recent years is often more of a frontlash. This history of ideas shows us that the reported clash of opposites is more like a family feud.

Quinn Slobodian is Professor of International History at the Frederick S. Pardee School of Global Studies at Boston University. His most recent books are *MILKISM: A Guide for the Perplexed* (co-written with Ben Tarnoff), *Crack-Up Capitalism: Market Radicals and the Dream of a World Without Democracy*, *Market Criticisms: Neoliberals East and South*, and *Globalists: The End of Empire and the Birth of Neoliberalism*.
